INDIAN STATISTICAL INSTITUTE.

FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT 1986/37*

The Indian Statistical Institute sustained two heavy losses by death during the year under review.

SIR RAIENDRA NATH MOOKERIER 1854-1936.

Sir Rajentra, Nath Mookerjee, the first fresident of the Indian Statistical Institute, died in Calentton on the Isth May, 1986. Boarn in 1884 in a small village near Calenta, by his own efforts by became the acknowledged lender of commerce and undustry in Bengal. He had truly appreciated the importance of statistics for the future propers of India, and came forward reality at the age of 78 to preside were the insugard meeting of the Institute feel on the 17th December, 1931. Since then he worked as the President of the Institute for more than four years, and retired from this office in April, 1936 only three weeks before his detail. He used to take a personni interest in the work of the Institute, and attended every meeting of the Council and of the Institute must failing hall made it impossible for him to do zo. The Institute over six were existence to his active interest, for without the lead given by him it would not have been possible to start its work in its oversent form.

A Special Meeting of the Imilian Statistical Institute was held on the 31st July, 1986 at which an obituary resolution was passed. A short sketch of his life was published in Sankhyd, Vol. 2, Part 3.

PROF. KARL PEARSON 1857-1936.

Karl Pearson was born on the Zith March, 1857 and died on the Zith April, 1936. He was the most entinent statistician of his time, and by his life long labours as the Editor of the Biometrika and the Annats of Engentes, as a teacher, and as the founder of a new school of research, succeeded in placing the science of statistics on a secure foundation. He was interested in the progress of statistical studies in India, and showed his sympathy with the aims and objects of the Institute by agreeing to be elected as its first Homorara Fellow in 1933.

An obstuary resolution was passed at a Sperial Meeting of the Institute held on the 31st July, 1386. A short memoir and a note on Karl Pearson's statistical writings were published in Sankhyd, Vol. 2, Part 4.

A STATISTICAL CONFERENCE IN INDIA.

The decision to organize a Statistical Conference in India in January 1938 marks a notable advance. In September 1934 the Monorary, Secretary had idiacussed this question with Pr. D. B. Meet, then Director-General of Commercial Intelligence and Statistics, who supported the proposal. The Horbite Sir Janues Grigg, Finance Member, Government of India, lad also kindly agreed to help in this matter. Outing to Dr. Meek's departure from India in December 1934 no farther action was lowever taken. Dr. John Matthai, the present Director General of Commercial Intelligence and Statistics, who was approached be the Homorary Secretary in this connection in July 1938, suggested that the first Conference might be held in 1930. The question was raised independently by Dr. Nazir Almari, Director, Cotton Technological Institute, Matunga, in July 1938. The proposal was considered by the Council of the Indian Statistical Institute in August 1936, and the Hon Secretary and substance to get in touch with different centres of statistical work in India to ascertain and report to the Conordi at an early date the possibility of holding meetings in different places in India of the Indian Statistical Conference, or other scientific organizations.

The Honorary Secretary prepared a note on the subject which was considered by the Council of the Institute at a meeting held on the 2nd April, 1937. As Ita as it could be ascertained general

opinion was definitely in favour of organizing a Statistical Conference in India. It would not only give opportunities for the presentation and discussion of scientific and technical papers including methods of standardization and improvement of the collection of primary attainties, but would serve a most useful purpose in establishing personal contacts between statistical workers in different parts of the contarty. The Conference would also help in focasing public attention on the scope and importance of attaints, in securing grants from Government departments and public bodies, and in opening channels of private doubtions for the support of statistical studies and revesych

It was pointed out in the Secretary's report that there were practical difficulties in starting a statistical section as an integral part of either the Indian Science Congress or the Indian Renomic Conference. This plan was also open to objections on other grounds. Mostrus statistics has close affiliations with both recommics and the positive sciences, and it is neither possible nor desirable to acceled either. In this sistants in twas considered advisable to start a Statistic's Conference with an independent organization of its own, but working in close co-operation with both the Indian Science Congress and the Benomic Conference, this could be most conveniently achieved in practice by holding the Statistical Conference in alternate years, in the same place as the Science Congress and the Benomic Conference. It would then be possible to hold joint meetings and joint divisations by arrangement with these two organizations. In this plan statistics would serve as a connecting link between science and economics, and would foster active co-operation between the two which would be beneficial in every way.

After careful consideration of the question the Council approved of the principle of organizing andian Statistical Conference with an independent constitution of its own but in active co-operation with the Indian Science Congress and the Indian Recommit Conference.

The proposal of holding the first session of the Conference in Calcutta in January 1938 was also generally approved. An important teason in favour of this decision was that the Jubilee Session of the Indian Science Congress would be held in Calcutta at about the same time and would be attended by a large group of distinguished foreign scientists.

INVITATION TO PROP. R. A. PISEER TO VISIT INDIA.

An important decision was made by the Council this year in inviting Prof. R. A. Pisher to visit India during the cold weather of 1873-8. Originally a mathematical Pellow of the Conrille and Caisa College, Cambridge, he joined the Rothamsterl Agricultural Station and made mathematical statistics his special subject of research at the suggestion of Sir John Russell. A paper on the "Preparency Distribution of the Vuleas of the Correlation Coofficient" published in 1913 initiating important researches in the theory of exact sampling distributions in recent years. The memoir "On the Mathematical Ponndations of Theoretical Statistics" was published in 1821, and a little later in 1923 the paper on field experiments which led to the development of the theory of design of experiments. This has revolutionized the technique of research in agriculture, industry, biology, psychology and other studies involving multiple factors of varietion. The book on the "Creential Theory of Natural Selection" in 1928 gave a new direction to researches in genetics and heredity. In 1929 Prof. Pisher was elected a Pellow of the Royal Society, and in 1833 succeeded Karl Pearson in the Catlon Chair in the University of London.

The methods developed by Prof. Pisher are being extensively used in India. A beginning has also been made in this country in researches in analytic statistics, a sobject of rapidly growing importance in which Prof. Pisher is the recognized leader. It was felt that his help at this inserture would be invaluable for organizion the future moorramme of statistical studies in India.

In consultation with Mr. S. P. Mookerjee (Vice-President of the Indian Statistical Institute, and Vice-Chancellor of the University of Calentta), the Hony, Secretary write nonfficially on behalf of the Institute to Prof. R. A. Fisher suggesting that he should wish India next winter (1937-38) Prof. Fisher in his letter, dated the 18th February, expressed his willingness to come to India in December 1937-January 1938, and stated that the invitation being from a scientific society, he would ask for an honoranium of only 200 besides expenses. The University of Calentta have decided to invite Prof. Fisher to give a short course of lectures on mathematical statistics at the Calenta University and have sunctimed on honoranium of Rs. 2000 for this purpose. With this assurance of co-operation from the University of Calenta, the Connect of the Institute decided on the 2nd April, 1937 to send Prof. Fisher a definite mvitation on behalf of the Indian Statistical Institute to visit India next winter, and it is hoped that Prof. Fisher would be able to accept it. A Gausanter Find has been opened to meet the expenses in connexion with Prof. Fisher's visit, and it has been decided to seek the co-operation of selemble institutions and oniversities in India in this matter.

SCHEME OF EXAMINATIONS IN STATISTICS.

Appreciable progress has been made in connexion with the scheme of examinations for the award of diplomas and certificates for proficiency in statistics which had received formal sanction of the Institute at the last annual meeting in April 1936. In order to maintain adequate scientific standards it had been decided that at least one examiner and one moderator in each examination should be appointed from among well-known statisticians from outside India. We are glad to report that Messrs. A. L. Bowley (London), R. A. Fisher (London), E. S. Pearson (London), A. C. Aitken (Edinburgh), J. Wishart (Cambridge) and J. O. Irwin (London) have kindly agreed to act either as moderators or examiners. It is hoped that the first examinations will be held at an early date.

REPORT ON OFFICIAL STATISTICS.

The Report of the Committee for Official Statistics which was adopted at a meeting of the Council last year was widely circulated, and the recommendations made in this report have been receiving careful consideration by the Government of India. The Report was favourably received by different Chambers of Commerce and other bodies interested in this question."

GRANT FROM THE GOVERNMENT OF INDIA.

A grant of Rs. 5,000 per year was sauctioned by the Government of India in 1935 on certain conditions which were accepted by the Institute. In accordance with these conditions we had ambertaken responsibilities of three different kinds: (a) to attend to enquiries of a statistical nature, (b) to give special courses of training (extending from one month to a year in duration) in analytic statistics to officers who may be sent by Government departments or recognized scientific and educational institutions to the Statistical Laboratory, Calcutta, on deputation for this purpose, and (c) to take up special investigations in statistics. As regards the research programme it had been agreed that subjects for investigations would be taken up as far as practicable in the following order of preference:-(1) mathematical and theoretical statistics; (2) educational and biometric (including medical and public health) studies; and (3) statistics relating to economics and other subjects.

The Research Programme for 1936-37 was settled by circulation in June 1936, and various questions were discussed with individual members of the Committee from time to time.

Mr. Samarendranath Roy, who had joined in November 1935, continued his work on theoretical statistics. Mr. Jatischandra Sen who had been appointed in 1935 for work on group tests of intelligence had responed in January 1936 to take up an educational appointment elsewhere. The post was not filled as no competent research assistant in this subject was available on an allowance of Rs. 75 per month which was all that could be set apart for this purpose. Dr. P. V. Sukhutme, Ph.D. (London) was given this allowance as a part-time worker in theoretical statistics for about three months (July-September, 1936). He went away in October 1936 on his appointment as Statistician in the Imperial Institute of Sugar Technology, Camppore. Mr. K. Raghavan Nair, M.A. (Madras), formerly research student in statistics in the University of Madras, who started work in November 1936, is at present drawing this allowance. He is working mainly in applied statistics. A number of junior computers on allowances of from Rs. 25 to Rs. 50 per month were paid out of the fund set apart for research.

RESEARCH WORK

Research and advanced studies in statistics under the anapiezs of the Institute were carried on as meant in the Statistical Laboratory, Calcutta. Besides the grant from the Government of India, as meantared grants were also received by the Statistical Laboratory from the Imprical Connoil of Agricultural Research and other sources. The work in the Laboratory is however organized on a mintary plau, and a consolidated report of the work done during the year mother review is given telebor.

Work in different branches of theoretical and applied statistics was conducted under the general guidance of P. C. Mahalanobis. Rajchandra Bose and Summendranath Roy continued their researches in mathematical statistics. Subhenila Sekhari Bose worked mainty on the application of statistical theory in agricultural field experiments, and also on certain topics in theoretical statistics. Solidier Kumar Boarcjer and Jitendranohas Sen Gupla were in charge of the computation work.

Mathematical Statistics. Tables of the percentage values of the D'statistics for old number of variates had been completed last year, and similar worz was finished this year for even number of variates. It involved a pretinuary tabulation of a previously antibulated bessel function by laborious numerical integration. Interesting statistical interpretations of Rectaingular Co-ordinates and their simple functions were decovered which, it is hoped, would prove useful in the study of sampling distributions of practical importance. Following Romanowsky some work has been dune on the calculation of mixed moments of statistical parameters, and it has been shown that cream differential operators and matrices of differential operators, play a lundamental part in determining such moments. The distribution of means of samples stream from MacKay's Bessel function population has been found to be of the same form as the parent population. Properties of a Bissel function distribution, and the relative efficiency of various estimates of the regression teedificient table and published.

Agricultural Retarch. A great deal of work was done in connexion with the analysis and interpretation of results of field experiments. A few topics of general interest are mentioned here. The method of estimating individual yields in the case of nuxed up plets was obtained hat year; appropriate standard errors for testing the treatment means including mixed up yields have been now obtained, and it has been shown that the loss of information with two mixed up plots corresponds to the limiting value of half a degree of freedom. A statistical analysis of the yield of the permanent unaminals conducted over 22 years in Pusa law been published; an which the rates of annual deterioration in soil fertility under the different organic and morganic fertilisers have been determined. The optimism shape and size of plot for sugarcane experiments was determined from a study of a uniformity trial experiments in Bilitar and Assam. A pretrainary study has also been made of certain data relatine to not likenthes in relation to heritaction in supercase.

Biometry and Anthropometry. By kind permission of Lt. Col. M. Das, I.M S., Superintendent of the Aligore Central Jail, a survey of blood-pressure of over 2000 convicts in the Aligore Central Jail was completed with the help of Dr. J. C. Gupta of the Caranchael Medical College, and Dr. P. Guba of the Caranchael Medical Kedical School.

Work has also proceeded on anthropometric data relating to certain Beugal costes collected by Dr. Ilbupendra Nath Datta; to Aiuol, Kuks, Garos, Marrings, Memi Nagos and Hajongs collected by Mr. Jyostan Kumar Bose; and to Mahjaharias and Malters collected by Mr. Sasabta Savkar Profile photographs are also being slowly collected with the help of the new Probloscope designed and constructed in the Laboratory.

Nutrition Research. The statistical analysis of data relating to height and weight of more than 5000 school children belonging to different schools and communities in Mairas, which were sent by Dr. W. R. Aykroyd, Director, Nutrition Research Laboratories, Coondor, was completed during the year, and a report will be shortly published.

Forest Research. A statistical study was made of the effect of root-competition on the growth of teak trees on the bases of data supplied by the Imperial Institute of Forest Research, Deltre-Dan The proportion of heart-wood and sup-wood in teak was studied in relation to the diameter of the plant at breast beight (d.b.h.), age and height of the plant.

Radlo Research. The connexion between thousderstorms and upper air ionization was investigated by statistical methods on the basis of data collected by Prof. S. K. Mitra and his co-workers in the University College of Science, Calcutta.

Economic Statistics. A paper on "Should we Devaluate the Ruper?" prepared by Mr. Sadhindra Nath Sen and Dr. H. C. Sinha was presented before the Agra session of the Indian Economic Conference, and has been published in its proceedings. Valuable data relating to the indebtedness of 423 families in villages near Bolper, which were collected by Mr. Santipriya Bose of the Visvabluerati Institute of Rural Reconstruction, have been statistically analysed in detail.

Hooghly-Howrah Flushing and Irrigation Schome. At the instance of the Government of Bengal a statistical note was prepared on the scheme of irrigation of an area measuring 916 square miles lying in Burdwan, Hooghly and Howrah districts. The actual rainfall during the period 1901-1935 was studied to find out by how much it fell short of the actual requirements for paddy in each season. How far the defect could be made up from the water available in the Damodar river was also determined. The yield of parkly during the same period was studied in detail and estimates were made regarding the increase in the yield which would have been obtained if the arrigation scheme had been in operation during the whole of this period. This note has been printed by the Government of Bengal.

Survey of Hand-loam Weaving Industry in Bengal. A survey of hand-loom weaving industry in Bengal was conducted by the Statistical Laboratory on behalf of the Bengal Board of Economic Enquiry at a cost of about eighteen thousand rupees. The survey was conducted according to the method of representative sampling with the mouse as the sampling unit. The information was collected mostly in the form of sub-samples, and statistical controls were provided in the form of replicated investigations of about five per cent, of the families by independent workers. The survey covered about 8000 weaving, and 2000 non-weaving (mainly agricultural) families in thirteen districts. The family form comprised over 250 items relating to income, expenditure, debt, weaving and agricultural productions, etc. A more detailed survey was made of family hadgets for about 1000 families, and of about 100 important cloth markets in different districts. Mr. Niliar Chandra Chakravarty, M.A., of the Bengal Civil Service, was placed on special duty as Supervisor, and a temporary staff of two inspectors, fourteen investigators, and four computers were engaged for this work. A preliminary report on data relating to the first eight districts surveyed was prepared by the Supervisor, and has been already published by the Government of Bengal. Detailed statistical analysis of the data is proceeding, and a full report will be assued in due course.

A lecture on the "Life and Work of Karl Peranon," was given by P. C. Mahalanobis and has been published in Samhidy. Dr. P. V. Suklatame who had just returned to India after a course of study and research in the Blometric Edoratory, London, gave a series of lake after a corrective researches in satisfaces with special reference to his own investigations. The use of rectangular coordinates in the study of sampling distributions of various statistical parameters formed the subject of a series of lectures by Mr. R. C. Bose. Other lectures were also arranged to help the less advanced teasistical workers including the computing stud of the Laboratory.

A Special Meeting of the Institute was held on the J1st July, 1936 at which obituary resolutions were passed in memory of Sir R. N. Mookerjee and Karl Pearson.

Four meetings of the Council of the Institute were held on the 31st July, 1936, 19th February and 2nd and 27th April, 1937, at which a large amount of business was transacted.

POONA BRANCH

Prof. D. G. Karve was the Secretary of the Poona Branch throughout the year. The number of life members at the Branch was 12 and of local members 2.

Dr. S. R. Savur read a paper on 'Obtaining a fit better than that given by the method of least squares,' which was followed by a discussion in which several members, including professors of mathematics, took part. The paper will be published in Sanklys in due course.

Prof. D. R. Gadgil was kind enough to conduct on behalf of the Institute foor weekly classes in the enematary statistical methods, which were attended by research students and staff of several institutions in Poons. Our best thanks are due to Prof. Gadgil and Dr. Savur for their valoable beto.

As anticipated in the report of the last year, the Government of Bombay agreed to supply to the Braunth its annual publications. These are too boing received and notes regarding their statustically important contents will soon begin to be published in Sankhyā.

Several members of the Branch connected with the University of Bombay are trying to secure the inclusion of statistics in the examination curricula for degree examinations. Some progress has been made in this matter, and it is hoped that under the revised degree courses of the University, Statistics will get its proper place.

The members of the Branch personally advised several official and non-official workers regarding the statistical side of the latter's work.

Prof. K. B. Madhava was in charge of the Mysore Branch which worked in association with the Departments of Psychology and Roonomics of the University of Mysore. The survey of vagrants in Mysore city, work on which had been started last year, was completed and an interesting report was issued in this connexion. There were SY7 vagrunt families connisting of 701 persons most of whom were living alone. The causes of vagruncy appear to be in many cases domestic unhappiness, religious complex, or an inform vagahond spirit; entemployment was also found to be responsible to a great extent. Some of the vagrunts were however in comparatively affinent circumstances; some even possessed house and jewellery. The vagrancy problem is a part of the leggar problem, and arrangements are being made for a sourcey of leggars in Mysore city which is likely to furnish information for preparing a comprehensive scheme to deal effectively with the situation.

BONBAY BRANCH.

Mesars, G. S. Ghurye and S. R. Deshpande were in charge of the Bombay Branch as Local Sectaries. Four meetings were held at which papers were read and discassed. At the first meeting Prof. D. Ghosi read a poper on "The use of census figures to ascerdain the fertility of one population," Prof. J. Marchan addressed the next gettering on the importance of the A.C.B. terme-hest-hip index as an indication of health. Mr. Kosade explained at the third meeting the importance of a complex single experiment as against a series of sample ones by drawing on his experience in the sampling of cotton. Prof. N. B. Molhhava gave a lecture on "the reliability of marking by examiners."

A nauther of committees have been formed: one to look into the statistics maintained by maternity bospitals; another, to go into the ceasus alat and a third to fix up a programme of work and advise on the expansion of the existing activity.

SANKEYA: THE INDIAN JOURNAL OF STATISTICS.

Four issues of Sunkhyl were published turing the year under review. On the malternatical and analytic side the standard of the papers published has been maintained at a high level. In fact there is some reason for complaint that many of the papers were of a technical nature, and of interest to a limited circle of specialists. There is urgent need of papers giving broad reviews of crossonic and business statisties, and it is intended to pay special attention to this question in the ensuing year.

The Audited Accounts which are given below moghly show the financial position for the first two volumes of the journal. The number of subscribers is slowly increasing, but there was a heavy deficit amounting to Rs. 5423-1-19 which was met from private sources.

A meeting of the Council of the Indian Statistical Institute was held at 4-0 P.M. on Priday the 2nd April, 1937 in the Durbhanga Building, Calcutta.

Proj. R. A. Fisher's visit to India.

2. Prof. P. C. Mahalanobis, Secretary, reported that in consultation with Mr. S. P. Mookerjee (Vice-President of the Indian Statistical Institute, and Vice-Chancellor of the University of Calcuta)

he had written usofficially on behalf of the Institute to Prof. R. A. Füller suggesting that he should visit India next winter (1874-38). Prof. Fisher in his letter dated 19th Pebruary expressed his willingness to come to India in December 1837—january 1838, and stated that the invitation being from a scientific society, he would ask for an honorarium of only £200 lesisles expresses. The Symiletter of the University of Calvatta have recommended to the Senate that Prof. Pisher be invited to give a short course of lectures on mathematical statistics at the Calcutta University, and that an honorarium of Rs. 2,000 - be sentitioned for this purpose.

It is suggested that the enoperation of other scientific institutions and universities intersted in this matter should also be invited and they should be asked to contribute to a guarantee and to be uppened for this purpose. It is estimated that the cost of Prof. Fisher's risit would amount to about Rs. 6,000.; to this most be aduled the expenses for visiting places other than Calcula, but such expenses would be recovered from the ecooperating institutions. Prof. Maltahanobis has already written unofficially to the local Branches of the Institute and to a few other persons in this connexion.

Statistical Conference.

5. Read the following report submitted by the Secretary :-

A STATISTICAL CONFERENCE IN INDIA.

(1) The question of organizing an Indian Statistical Conference has been under consideration for some time. In September 1984 Prof. P., C. Malatianobis Itad discussed this question with Dr. D. B. Meck, then Director-General of Commercial Intelligence and Statistics, who had strongly supported the proposal. The Hon'tlde Sir James Grigg, Finance Member, Government of India, also had kindly agreed to help in this matter. Owing to Dr. Meck's departure from India in December 1934 no farther action was however taken. In July 1933, Prof. Malatanobis wrate to Dr. John Matthai, the present Director General of Commercial Intelligence and Statistics, who suggested that the first conference might be held in 1936. The question was raised independently Dy Dr. Nair Abuned, Director, Cotton Technological Institute, Matungg in July 1938. The proposal was considered by the Council of the Indian Statistical Institute inaAugust 1936, and the following resolution was passed in this connexion.

Resolved that Prof. P. C. Mahalanobis, Honorary Secretary, be authorized to get in touch with different centres of Statistical work in India to ascertain and report to the Council

at an early date the possibility of holding meetings in different places in India of the Indian Statistical Institute or statistical conferences either independently or in conjunction with the Indian Science Congress, the Indian Recommic Conference, or other scientific organizations.

(2) As far as it can be ascertained general opinion is in favour of organizing a Statistical Conference. It will not only give opportunities for the presentation and discussion of scientific and technical papers, and of nethods of standardization and improvement of the collection of primary statistics, but will be useful in other ways. People from different provinces and Indian States, both official and non-official, will be brought together in such a Conference, which will enable personal constacts being established between statistical workers in different parts of the country. In the present nongranized condition of statistical studies in India, there is accusely any social stimulus to research outside two or three big centres; an Annual Conference will give encouragement to workers in isolated centres by bringing literal in touch with other workers. A Conference will also help in focusing public attention on the scope and importance of statistics, in securing grants from Government departments and public lockies, and also in opening channels of private doustions for the support of statistical studies and research.

The volume of statistical work has increased rapidly in recent years in India, and in case a statistical Conference is starred there will be no dearth of papers. It may be stated with confidence that the general standard will be as high as that of papers presented before the Indian Science Congress or the Beonomic Conference, and that the total number of papers will be considerably greater than that usually presented before some of the smaller sections of the Indian Science Congress. The case in favore of a Statistical Conference may therefore be considered as established.

(3) The organization of the proposed Statistical Conference may be now considered. Unthe mathematical and analytic side of statistical work there are certain advantages in keeping in local with the Indian Science Congress, especially with the sections of Physics and Mathematics, Agriculture, Medicine, Anthropology, and Psychology. During the last two or three years, the question of opening a Statistical Section was informally discussed with the authorities of the Indian Science Congress, but the response has not been sufficiently encouraging.

The organization of the Indian Economic Conference is more unitary and centralized than that of the Indian Science Congress, and there are difficulties in fitting in a Statistical Section in the existing scheme.

It does not therefore seem (easible to start a statistical section as an integral part of either the Science Congress or the Economic Conference. Apart from practical difficulties, this plan is also open to objections on other grounds. Modern statistics has close affiliations with both economics and the positive sciences. It is neither possible nor desirable to exclude either. In this situation the best course will be to start a Statistical Conference which will have an independent organization of its own but which will work in close association with both the Science Congress and the Economic Conference. This can be most conveniently achieved in practice by bolding the session of the Statistical Conference, in alternate years, in the same place as the Science Congress and the Economic Conference. It will be then possible to hold joint meetings and joint discussions by arrangement with these two organizations. In this plan statistics will serve as a connecting link between science and economics, and will foster a close co-operation between the two which will be beneficial in every way.

(4) The next point requiring consideration is the place and time of the first Statistical Conference. Three proposals have been received in this connexion. Prof. Ghurve, Sceretary of the Bombay Branch, has suggested that the Conference should be held in Bombay just before the Christmas holidays this year (1937) at about the same time as the session of the Population Conference. Mr. P. H. Carpeuter has suggested the second or third week of December 31 in New Delhi. The third proposal is to have the Statistical Conference in Calcutts in the first week of January 1838 at about the same time as the Jubilee Session of the Indian Science Congress which will be stateded by a large group of distinguished British and foreign scientists.

A great city, the simultaneous session of the Population Conference, and the existence of a localization of the Statistical Institute are the points in favour of Bombay. In New Dethi the chief attraction is the help and presence of the high officials of the Government of India. In favour of Calcutta it may be pointed out that a very large number of scientific workers will gather there next January. The high officials of the Government of India will also be present there at that time. Finally in Calcutta we may count on the active co-operation of the members of the Statistical Institute as well as of the workers in the Statistical Laboratory. Calcutta would thus combine the advantages of both Bombay and Dethi.

(i) Having considered the report submitted by Prof. P. C. Mahalanobis, Honorary Secretary, it was resolved that the Council approves of the general principle of organizing an Indian Statistical

Conference with an independent constitution of its own, but in active co-operation with the Indian Science Congress and the Indian Economic Conference.

- (ii) Resolved that the proposal of holding the first Session of the Conference in Calcutta in January, 1938 be also generally approved.
- (iii) The Hon. Secretary be authorized to write to the Indian Science Congress and the Economic Conference seeking their co-operation in this matter,
- (iv) Resolved that the Hor. Secretary be requested to circulate a note on this subject inviting the opinion of members and local Branches of the Institute, and the matter be placed before the next Annual Meeting of the Institute.
