Tenth Annual Report: 1941-42

The present report gives a brief review of the Institute's activities in the tenth year of its existence. In spite of growing difficulties under war conditions our work was continued on more or loss normal lines. Is became, however, increasingly difficult to maintain intellectual centact with countries outside fadia, and towards the end of the year, evacuation arrangements had to be made due to Calcutta being declared an emergency area. Details about those arrangements are given later on in this report.

THE FIFTH SESSION OF THE INDIAN STATISTICAL CONFERENCE, BARODA 1942.

The Conference was opened by Hill Highness fir Pratap Singh Gacksetd, Maharajah of Barola on the 3rd January 1942 in the Central Hall of the Science Institute, Baroda. Siz V. T. Krinhamanchariar, Dewan of Baroda welcomed the members and visitors as Chairman of the Reception Committee. Siz T. Vijayaraghavacharyar, the General President of the Conference, in his address pointed out the importance of applying moderns statistical methods in the design of agricultural experiments and in the relievance of agricultural statistics. The technique of random sampling surveys was indepenable for improving the accuracy of our agricultural statistics. After the presidential address Prof. P. C. Mahalamoha, Honorary General Secretary, presented an Annual Review of the activities of the Indian Statistical Institute. The function was brought to a close with a vote of thanks proposed by Mr. A. C. Mutherjes, Loral Secretary of the Conference.

The first academic session of the Conference was held jointly with the Section of Mathematics and Statistics and the Section of Agriculture of the Indian Science Congress on the 2nd January and was presented over by Sir Y. Vijayanghavacharyar. Dr. V. O. Panse of Indore openvia a discussion on "The Use of Factorial and Incomplete Block Designs in Agriculture". Messer. R. C. Bose (Cal-utta), K. Kislen (Cawmpore), R. S. Koshal (Bembay), S. S. Iyer (Delhi), Dr. P. V. Sakhatme (Delhi), and Mr. K. R. Nair (Calcutta) took part in the discussion.

The Presidential Address of the Section of Mathematics and Statistics, Indian Science Congress, was delivered by Prof. P. C. Mahalanobis on the 4th January. The subject was 'Sample Surveys'.

On the afternoon of the same day there was a joint meeting with the vection of Mathematics and Statistics of the Indian Science Congress with Dr. C. W. B. Normand in the chart. There was an interesting discussion on "Problems of Discrimination" in which Prof. D. D. Kosambi (Poona), Mr. R. C. Hose (Ualcutta), Dr. U. S. Nair (Trivandrum), and Dr. V. G. Passe (Indow) took part.

On the morning of Monday, January 8th, there was a discussion on "Administrative Stelastics" with Dr. P. N. Barerjos in the chair. Among those who took part in the discussion were Mr. A. C. Mukherji (Baroda), Prof. P. C. Mahakanobis, Prof. O. S. Ohurye (Bonbay), Prof. K. B. Madhava (Mysore), Mr. J. M. Kochar (Dwalior), Mr. M. V. Rao (Jodhpur), Dr. P. V. Sukhatme (Debh), Rajye Ratna S. V. Mukherji (Baroda), Dr. U. S. Nair (Trivandrum), Mr. N. S. R. Santry (Madras), Mr. G. D. Mathur (Ahmeslabad), Mr. S. B. Sem (Calcutta) and Dr. M. Zauddin (Labore).

In the afternoon of the same day there was a joint mosting with the Section of Psychology and the Section of Mathematics and Statistics of the Indian Science Congress with Prof. K. B. Mathara in the chair. There was a discussion on "Factor Analysis" in which Mr. R. C. Bose and Dr. Copewar Pal of Calcutta, Mr. B. Kapparesmy of Mysors and Mr. S. Jabtos of Shokapur participated.

On the morning of Tweeday, January 8th, there was a discussion on "Cenma and Vital Statistics" presided over by Rajya-Ratna S. V. Mutherji. Prof. K. B. Mathava; (Mysore), Prof. P. C. Mahakanobia, Mr. N. S. R. Sastry (Madras), Mr. A. C. Mutherji (Baroda), Dr. U. S. Nair (Trivandrum), Mr. B. N. Datar (Calcutta), and Prof. M. Ziauddin (Labore) took part.

In the afternoon there was a discussion on "Teaching of Statistics" presided over by Mr. A. C. Mukherji (Baroda), Mr. K. R. Nair (Cafcutta), Dr. M. Zisauddin (Lahore), Mr. R. C. Bose (Calcutta), and Dr. U. S. Nair (Thyeandrum) took part,

All the meetings were well attended by statistical workers from different parts of India. A large number of papers on Theoretical and Applied Statistics we saincluded in the programme, several of which were taken up for reading after the different discussions.

The following resolutions were passed by the Conference:

- (1) Recoived that the Indian Statistical Conference welcomes the proposal to inangurate an Indian Congress of Social Science which will hold its Sessions along and in cooperation with the Indian Science Congress, the Indian Association for Agricultural Economies, the Indian Political Science Conference, and other associations and institutions interested in this matter.
- (2) Resolved that the Indian Statistical Conference and the Section of Mathematics and Statistics of the Indian Science Congress recommend to the Government of India (e) the creation in the immediate future of a Standing Advisory Board for the Indian Census to give advice in regard to the technical aspects of consus operations and (b) the creation of a permanents Bursers for Consus and Vital Statistics.

THEORETICAL RESEARCHES

Theoretical researches were continued on a systematic plan on three main topics: (1) measures of statistical divergences with appropriate arnot distributions; (2) design of experiments; (3) design of large-scale sample surveys together with model sampling experiments on non-nardom fields. A good deal of work was done in the third subject superially in commarion with the development of an efficient technique for cross-estimating surveys.

D'-Statistic: Work on the theoretical side was continued under the leadership of S. N. Roy who investigated the sampling distributions, on the non-null hypothesia, of a set of p-statistics which enable us to discriminate better and classify a number of multivariate normal populations in respect of variances and covarismess, and forther a number of sets of multivariate normal populations (supposed to have the same dispersion matrix) in respect of sets of mean values for the different character.

On the applied dide tables for the five per cost and one per cent points of the "De" Statistic are being worked out by S. N. Roy and P. K. Bose under the guidance of P. C. Mahalanobie with the help of a greatfrom the Imperial Conneil of Agricultural Research.

Design of Experiments: Important contributions were made to the mathematical theory of the design and analysis of experiments by R. C. Bose, K. R. Nais and others. A new method of partitioning (m³ - 1) degrees of freedom belonging to the contrasts between m³ objects into (m + 1) sets of (m - 1) degrees of freedom each (m = ps), which had no reference to orthogonal sets of Latin Squares, was discovered. Work on Non-desarguesian Latin Squares was continued. The problem of confounding of interactions in asymmetrical factorial experiments well successfully tackled and methods of construction of balanced designs and their statistical analysis were investigated. Incidentally this work led to the discovery of a general type of quasi-factorial designs.

During of Sample Surveys: Extensive model sampling experiments were organized in the Statistical Laboratory under the guidance of P. C. Mahalanobis for studying the variance function for random non-random (or pattarned) fields: and a first account was given in a note published in the Science and non-random (Vol. 7, p. 54, July 1941) and in the presidential address to the Mathematics and Statistics section of the Indian Science Coogress held in Baroda (January 1942). The findings in previous sampling surveys catually carried out by the Institute losd to further improvements in the technique of sample survey designs.

Problems of Distribution: Several problems on the multivariate distributions were worked out by M. P. Shrivastava, P. K. Bose and others in the current year. The basic integrals for the distribution of the multiple correlation coefficient of the second kind were also calculated which will be useful in the construction of tables.

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SPECIAL EXQUIRIES AND PROJECTS

As in previous years a large number of statistical surveys was undertaken on behalf of various Covernment departments and public authorities.

Just Area Crasus Scheme: In 1941, the occcluding year of the five year scheme for the improvement of the Justo forecast, we carried out for the first time a full scale provincial survey covering an area of 68,199 square miles in Bergal. We started in 1937 with a complete reumeration of only 124 square miles and a sample survey with units of size 5 acres; we apent less than seven thousand rupers on the field work, and yet this gave us most valuable information regarding the cost of operations and the possibilities of the sample survey. In 1939 a seatartal a systematic study of hoth variance and cost functions, and sport of the sample survey. The work done proced conclusively that the sample survey could be used with survers in actual practice. In 1939 the field work was further expanded to cover 2,553 square miles at a total expenditure of fix. 49,000. It now became clear that for general use sample-units of 4 acres would also be useful. This completed the first phase of the work. In 1940 we carried out a trial survey on a large scale in eight important jute districts covering 20,553 square miles at a cost of about sixty thousand rupees for the field work sione.

In 1941, we used sample-units of size varying from 1 acre to 9 acres, nearly half the number bring:
of size 5 of 4 acres; the density (or number of sample-units) varied from 0.22 to 3.30 per square nule for
the 50 stample. The geographical unit was the thana or police circle with an average acres of 110 square
miles. For purposes of soning these were grouped into ten classes according to the intensity of cultivation, and wree allotted the appropriate number of sample-units of the required size.

The field work was arranged in the form of two independent but inter-ponetrating half-amples. Linked pairs of sample-units were located at random on maps in the form of domb-bell shaped figures one end of which represented the sample-unit belonging to half-ample (A) and the other end represented the sample-unit belonging to half-ample (B). The information for all sample-units belonging to half-ample (A) was collected by one set of investigators while the information for the sample-units belonging to half-ample (B) was collected independently by an entirely different set of investigators. The time programms was arranged in such a way that investigators belonging to the two different sets (A) and (B) never worked in the same region at the same time. In this way we obtained independent errords for each of a pair of adjoining sample-joining, and two independent extrantees of the area soom with jute.

The survey was carried out over an area of nearly sixty thousand aquare miles and required a staff of about 500 mes. This in itself is not a large number, and had they been working in a compet proup it would have been an easy matter to supervise their work. In actual fact these men mere, however, scattered over the whole province. Careful preparations had to be made to keep contact with the field investigators, to arrange for the impection of the primary work, to ensure that the field records were promptly departched to head-quarters and so on. In spite of these difficulties the agreement between the two half-surples was quite assistance.

The line of progress was thus from intensive work on a small scale to a well-planned survey on an extensive scale covering practically the whole of Bengal. The method of a succession of gradually expanding exploratory surveys has been thus fully justified. In this plan each stape of the work was decided in the light of the superience gained during earlier phases. It enabled complete and flexible control being maintained over the whole work. And finally it made possible the gradual development of the statistical technique on one hand, and, on the other, the building up of a trained staff without which it would have been impossible to undertake the full scale survey in 1941.

The Jute Census Committee had decided that a final estimate with a margin of error not exceeding flower cent would be usefuntate present purposes and had desired that attempts should be made to get the attimates ready; if peasible, by the middle of August or within one week of the completion of the field work. The last batch of field records was reviewed in the Statistical Laboratory on the 20th August 1941 and a preliminary satinate was submitted on the 27th August 1941. This therefore fully satisfied the condition of a quick estimate laid down by the Jute Consus Committee.

As regards accuracy, the sample estimate was 16.76,631 acres with a probable error of about 17,000 acres, that is, with a margin of error of about three per cent at odds of 50 to 1. Fortunately a completely objective check was available. In 1941 the Government of Bengal had prepared a complete record of section individual pick under jute for purposes of the Juta Regulation Act at a cost of about filton liable of rupose; and the final estimate according to this complete enumeration was 15.2,855 acres. The difference between the sample estimate and to complete censure is thus only about 43,000 acres, which is less than three per cent. Considering that the sample estimate was considered over the whole sowing esseno while the registration figure referred to the end of the season the agreement is probably even better. The sampling estimate for 1941 thus fully satisfied the standard of accuracy laid down by the Juta Cenesa Committee.

The total expenditure including statistical analysis on the 1941 Jute Conema Scheme was Re. 1,52,000. But in the Report on the 1941 Scheme which the Honorary Secretary submitted towards the end of 1941 is was mentioned that a sample censan could be carried out in 1942, on the same scale as in 1941 and without sacrificing the precision, with a total expenditure of Re. 1,14,000. If a combined scheme for estimating total production were to be taken up to get the area as well as the yield per acre of jute, it was estimated that a total expenditure of Re. 1,15,000 in 1942 would be sufficient. The -Into Consus Committee has provided Re. 18,000 for crop-cutting experiments on jute in 1942. On the 27th March 1942 information was received that the Bengal Government had anactioned Re. 1,00,000 for an area ceases in 1942 in combination with the crop-cutting envi. The Honorary Secretary submitted proposals assigneding that the whole amount abould be given as a block grant to the Institute on certain conditions which were approved by the Council on the 8th April 1942. Preparatory work was started immediately and was progressing smoothly at the time of writing the report.

Just and Aus Paddy: Bengal 1941: This was the second year of work on the yield of just financed by the Indian Central Just Committee and the Bengal Board of Economic Enquiry. The survey included the eight main jute-growing districts in Bengal, and about 2,850 aample-cuts were finally recorded for Jute and Aus Paddy.

Sugarcons: United Provinces, 1941: This was the second year of the scheme financed by the Imperial Council of Agricultural Research. An area of 3.200 square miles slightly larger than that in the previous year was covered by this year's design. The technique of the design was further improved in the light of the experience gained in the previous year. The analysis of the previous year's data is nearing completion in the Statistical Laboratory, and a detailed report on the results is under preparation.

Wheel: United Province, 1942: In this case also, 1942 was the second year of the scheme financed by the U. P. Government. The design is on the same general principles as in the case of the Sugarcane Scheme. The field-work started in March 1942. The analysis of previous year's material as in progress in the Statistical Laboratory, and a detailed report on the results is under preventation.

Paddy: South Bergod, 1941-42: The Institute has been helping the Government of Bengal since 1999 in organizing extensive corp. cutting experiments on paddy in the Burdwan-Hooghly-Hownh Plushing and Irrigation Area. A design in three compartments was prepared this year on almost the same lines as in 1940-41, with some modifications suggested by the experience of last year's field work and statistical analysis of the material. The field work was carried out during the winter season of 1941-42, and the material is under analysis.

Consolidated reports on the results of analysis of material collected in the crop-estimating surveys of this area during 1933-39, 1939-40 and 1940-41 are under proparation. These reports would have been completed early this year, but owing to heavy pressure of work in connexion with A.R.P. and ovacuation arrangements the Hony. Secretary was obliged to postpone the actual writing, although the bulk of the calculations was completed lone area.

Cinclena, 1941.42: At the request of the Government of Bengel, two echemes of an exploratory nature were prepared by the Hony. Secretary for developing a statistical method in order to forestat the yield of bark from the measurements of the characters on the highing cinchona plant. In one of the scheme work was concentrated on two specified age groups, namely, at the time of coppicing the plant and that of uprooting the plant. Satisfactory results were obtained from the data and a report was submitted to the Superintendent, Cinchona Cultivation in Bengel, Mungpoo. In the other scheme six different specty were included; and variations due to the age factor on the functional relation between the yield and the characters are being studied on the basis of material collected at the rischona plantations.

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Regional Surray of Borre Feats of Superrant, 190-0.1: The seleme had been in operation for some considerable time when the Hony. Field work on the lines suggested by us was started in November 1900 in min regions distributed over the whole of India and the field survey was completed on 30th November 1941. A periminary report was submitted in June 1941 on the basis of three months data; and a special grant has been recently sustained by the Imperial Council of Agricultural Research for the analysis of the nuterial whole is in progress.

Labour Enquiry in Bengal : In the last Annual Report we referred to a whome for enquiry into labour family budgets in Rengal which was entrusted to this Institute in June 1940 by the Bengal Board of Economic Enquiry and the Covernment of Bengal. Preliminary arrangements including the training of the field staff were made during July and August, but work was suspended in September under Government orders owing to abnormal conditions in the jute mills. The actual empiry thus started from about November 1940. During the year under review hudgets were collected in the Budge-Budge, Assumi, Sitarampur and Rangani and also in the Jagaddal area for the second time, and by the end of the year well over 3,000 labour budgets were collected altogether. The first sample of 613 budgets collected in the Jagualdal area during the period December 1940 to April 1941 was subjecteed to detailed statistical analysis and a Draft Report was submitted thereon in November 1941 and was under consideration by the Board and Government at the time of writing this report. It should be mentioned in this connection that the present enquiry has a much wider scope than ordinary cost-of-living enquiries in so far as data were collected on a wide variety of subjects such as family composition; sources of income; indebtedness and interest rates; prevalence of gambling and intoxicating habits; how the labourers spend their leisure; how any conditions; literacy; trade union membership; unemployment; percentages of inigratory and local labourers; and other topies. A special effort was also made to standarduo price quotations by suitable grading of important commodities and by setting up comparable grades at different places.

Nagpur Lobour Enquiry: Following up the recommendations of the Nagpur Textile Empiry Committee in 1940, of which the Honorary Secretary was appointed Plainian, the C. P. Goronnovat decided to take up a Cost-of-living enquiry during the year under review. Mr. M. P. Shrovatava was sent from the Institute in 1941 to be in technical charge of the enquiry under the general guidance of the Honorary Secretary and the work was progressing smoothly at the time of writing this report.

Public Perference Surray: An early as in April 1840 Pandit Javakintal Nehm; suggested to the Monorary Secretary during a convenation that we should take up the study of public epinion in this country as in advanced countries like the United States and Great Britain. During the year under order we recursed out several sample surveys among middle-class families living in Calcutta and also at one or two places in the motional with the help of a grant made by the All India Bardio authorities. We had a 'Radio' sample as well as a Concern' sample. We worked with a large variety of questions, political, savial, relicenses and cultural, in addition to those relating to preference among radio listeners regarding the various deriver of radio programmes in this country. A comprehensive report was submitted to All India Radio at July 1841 on the topics in which they had written that they were unterested. Pretiminary results relating to belief in astrology and palmistry, and opinion regarding whose renarriage, inter-sets and inter-command marriages sets, were given in the Annual Review presented by the Honorary Secretary before the Fifth Session of the Indian Statistical Conference held in Baroda in January 1942. A large volume of material however still remains to be analyeed.

Addition of the Monomay Secretary: The Hoays Secretary attended the meetings of the Plant Management (Agronomic) Committee and Statistical Committee of the Imperial Council of Agricultural Research in New Delhi in April 1911. Owing to prolonged illness sine August 1941 he took medical law from the Presidency College but continued his statistical work in the Institute. He also continued to act-as the Presidents of the Committee appointed by the Bengull Board of Economic Euspiric for an enquiry into the cost of cultivation of standard yield of staple recept in Bungal and as the Housers, Head of the Department of Statistics in the Calcutta University which was started in July 1941. He was out on tour practically throughout January this year. STATUTICAL ENQUIRING

As in previous years a large number of enquiries from all parts of India was attended to during the year under review. The distribution by subjects and by provinces is given below :--

STATISTICAL LIBRARY

The Library is taking a more and more important part in the activities of the Institute. The number of books purchased during the year was 310 and the number received for review in Sankhya was 48. The Library as beyeast receiving 351 annuals and 385 periodicals appearing more often than once a year. The number of books and periodicals issued for reference and on loan during 1941-42 was 1039. Among those who presented books and periodicals to the Library during the year, Mrs. 8 Mukherjes should be gratefully mentioned for the valuable collection of books of the late Dr. Syamadas Mukherjee consisting of 250 volumes on Mathematics and Physics. The service of the Library improving consistently, though additional strain was coused by the extensive use of the Library made by students and staff of the nextly opened University Department of Statistics. Also, as airs sky mentioned, the bulk of the Library has already, been shifted to Giridifs for the duration of the present emergency. Efforts are being made to resume the normal service of the Library at Giridih, where the bulk of the Institute workers as well as the whole University Department of Statistics with its teachers and students are going soon to settle down to normal work.

TRAINING AND EXAMINATIONS IN STATISTICS

During the year under review 16 officers from Assara, Bongal, Bihar, Baroda, Bombay, U. P., Punjab, and Sind came on deputation to the Institute for training in statistical theory and technique. Mr. K. Raghavan Nair was in charge of this section. From December 1941 onwards many officers who had arranged for training could not come over here for the purpose as a result of the present emergency. Arrangements are being made to have the training facilities opered up as Giridib.

Since January 1899 people other than those who came on deputation have been admitted to a standard training course hore. There were 8 advanced students during the year in addition to 10 apprentices for professional irmining. Besides practical classes and work on projects, bectures on theoretical and applied statistics were given by Prof. P. C. Mabalanobis, Mesra. S. N. Roy, K. R. Nair, S. Serepsupa, B. N. Datar, K. S. Banerjes and Mrs. C. Bose, Mr. A. R. Sinka, Depoty Director of Statistics, Commented to India kindly agreed as in the previous year to deliver a short course of fectures on Economic Statistics. Prof. P. C. Mahalanobia gave an additional advanced course of fectures on professional aspects of statistics. Mrs. C. Bose continued to be in charge of the training class during the year.

Institute Examinacions in Statistics : Only 2 out of 9 candidates who appeared in Statistical's Diploma Part I axamination held in January 1941 were successful and 2 more passed only in theoretical papers and another only in one of the two theoretical papers and of the three who took the Computer's Certificate Part I examination? Passed in Section I. In August 1941, Computer's Certificate examination and cylindus were held. The Board of Examinate consisted of Prof. K. B. Madhava (B) years University), Mr. R. C. Boss (Calcutta University), Mr. S. N. Roy (Statistics) Laboratory), Mr. N. C. Chakravati (Board of Economic Enquiry, Bagega) and Prof. F. C. Mahakasobia. There were 62 candidates for the examinations including Field Survey Certificate examination. Only one candidate passed all the Sections of Parts I(A), I(B) and of I(C) the Computer's Certificate examinations. Only one candidate passed all the Sections of Parts I(A) is and of I(C) the Computer's Certificate examinations, and 21 were completely unaucoomsful. If we take the leid survey examinations alone, however, 3 out of 8 passed both sections of the theoretical examination.

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INSTITUTE STAFF

As in previous years carmarked and block grants were received by the Institute from various sources for special enquiries and reports. The scientific work of the Statistical Laboratory was carried on as unsate on a unitary besis. An additional grant of Rs. 20,00 was associated during the year under review by the Ocorament of India in response to an appeal made by the Honorary Secretary, for the purpose of strength-ning the staff. During the year under review the workers were organized in the form of a basic staff who were organized in the form of a basic staff who were organized on long range projects and purely temporary workers who were remitted for a few months only.

The question of re-organization of the staff has been under consideration for a long time, but no action could be taken owing to the uncertainty of the financial position. Although most of the income of the Institute is derived from Government sources, the greater part of the money is macined in an extra marked form for particular projects or enquiries, and even the research grants are usually stanctioned from year to year. However, as many of the projects are continued from year to year, or new projects are undertaken in the place of old once, a largo number of sorkers of the staff had in posterior been in continuous employment for many years, and the question of giving them some kind of semi-permutent tactual became more suit more pressing. After a careful review of the position a Provident Fund with repeal contributions of one anna in the rupes from the workers and the finalitate was started from January 1941, and workers engaged on long range projects were permitted to join t.

The question of staff organization assumed a new importance when in April 1941 the Imperial Council of Agricultural Research decided to discontinue its grant (which has been in existence since 1931) but requested the Government of India to stabilize the Institute on a secure foundation by providing admost funds.

The absence of security of service was having a very bad effect on the staff; and many of the best workers were leaving the Laboratory for posta elsewhere. In April 1911 the Honorary, Secretary discussed the question at some considerable length or th. Mr. C. E. Jones, Secretary, Finance Department to the Government of India, and explored the possibilities of making some interim arrangements until the question of stabilization was settled by Government. As a result of this dissertion the Government of India stanctioned an additional grant of Rs. 20,000 for strengthening the staff and creating a sense of sourch.

The need of re-organizing the staff was becoming urgent also for other reasons. The workers of the Jaboratory had been advised for a long time to qualify themselves by passing the Institute Examinations. Three computers had passed the Computers' Certificate Part I Examination hold in 133% but it was found that it was difficult to pass the different parts of the examination as a whole, and it was decided by the Council in 1940 to re-organize the examination in several sections. In August 1941, as we have already mentioned, an examination was held for the first time under the compartmental system, and the results showed clearly that roughly one-third of the workers were not fully qualified in computational work as judicely by the standards set up by the Institute itself; and there was a clear case for eliminating the workers workers.

A general reduction in the computing staff had also become necessary owing to financial revisions. Since 1928 a large volume of work was being done in requestion with the Jute Census Scheme. In 1911 the total number of computer-months spect on the work was 470, which on the basis of 12 man-months for each worker engaged throughout the year means a total staff of 10 computers on an accrage. This was however a five-year scheme financed jointly by the Indian Central Jute Committee and the Government of Hengad which had started in 1937 and was due to be completed in 1941. The termination of the Jute Consus Scheme thus meant a reduction of existing requirements by roughly 40 workers in the computing section. The position was carefully considered by the Honorary Servetary in October 1941, and it was found that shoul 16 could be possibly shareful in other projects, but a reduction to the extent of at least 20 or 25 workers was inevitable which was immediately undertaken mainly on the basis of the examination results. This, mite naturally, gave rise to considerable dissatisfaction and discontent which however was mirroly unavoidable.

At the same time it was realised that the workers who had passed the Institute examination or had proved their worth by efficient arvives should recover some recognition in the form of increments are grated scales. Owing to his continued ill health since August 1941 and his pre-occupation in

ennanion with rescussion arrangements in January and February FMt the Honorary Secretary was bowever unable to make any definite recommendations. The financial position was also precarious. Although the Indian Central Jute Committee had recommended continuation of the Jute Cansus Scheme the Occurrence of Bengal had decided not to preceed with it in 1942 owing to the war situation. This meant a drop in increme of roughly Re. 4,0000 per year.

The Covernment of Bengal however auddenly decided towards the end of March to continue the Jute Cansus Scheme in 1842, and informed the Bonorary Severtary officially of this decision on the 26th March 1942. On neewing this information the Honorary Severtary immediately took up the question of staff re-organization, and submitted definite recommendations which wave generally approved by the Council of the Institute on the 9th April 1942 and were brought into effect from 1st April 1942. Although this re-organization, strictly speaking, falls outside the scope of the present report it would not be out of stakes to mention the salient features in view of the innortance of the question.

In view of the fact that the question of stabilizing the Institute was all under consideration by the operation of India it was felt that in the case of the higher technical staff whose seals of pay would begin at Ra. 100 or above, it would not be possible to take any concrete action at present. The question of re-organization of the computational and office staff with pay not exceeding Ra. 100 was however more pressing, and after careful consideration the Council decided to introduce two scales of pay, Ra. 364-75 and Ra. 60-5-100. In view of the uncertain financial position all appointments were to be made in the first instance for one year terminable by two months' notice on either side. All workers appointed in the graded scales would be immediately admitted to the Provident Fund. The Honorary Secretary was also empowered to make appointmenta in the graded scales for a period of not more than aix months subject to subsequent confirmation by the Council.

The Council decided that in making appointments to the graded scales due consideration should be given to length of service, efficiency of work, academic qualifications including Institute examinations and special experience. After a careful examination of individual records of work and in consultation with the inspecting and supervising staff the Hocorary Secretary prepared a list of 55 workers who were admitted provisionally to the gradul seales subject to confirmation by the Council. As already mentioned, action could not be taken owing to loak of financial resources in the case of 14 senior workers drawing Rs. 100 or more per month. Besides this there were 29 workers who had either not appeared in or fasted to pass even a single section of the Institute Examination or had no satisfactory record of work. Of these 19 were restained on a purely temporary basis but were informed that accreain the Institute Examination or unproved afficiency of work would make them eligible for the graded scales, while 9 were given provisional appointments for six months because though they had not passed any of the Institute examinations, they were considered to be efficient in their work.

During the year under review some of the workers left us to accept posts elsewhere. Mr. A. N. Bose left in June 1914 to be Principal, Srikail College, Tippers. He however rejoined in March 1912 as Assistant Secretary specially appointed by the Council to be in charge of the Colkette Gife under the period of emergency. Earlier Mr. K. Oupta who had left us in January 1941 to be Acting General Secretary, the Control Secretariat of Associations, Calcutta came back in May 1941 and was later appointed Anaistant Secretary by the Council to help the Honorary Secretary in general administration. Mr. M. P. Shrivastava went to Nagpur in July 1941 to take up the C. P. Cost-of-living enquiry. Mevers S. Sen Gupta and A. Bhattacharya left us to take up the C. P. Cost-of-living enquiry. Mevers S. PROVIDENT PUND

The Provident Fund put into operation in January 1841 with 'a basic contribution of one anna in the rupes from each worker and an equal contribution from the employers' filled a strong again facilities available to the Institute staff. This does not however meet our requirements, which refer in the unain the necessity of giving a sense of security to the workers. We hope and trust that we shall receive pubic support in our attempts to stabilities the Institute.

LOCAL BRANCHES OF THE INSTITUTE

The activities of the various branches of the Institute in different parts of India are continuing to help in the matter of popularizing the study of and interest in statistics among students and businessmen in India. Increasing interest has been taken in the work of the Branches generally, and the local Secretaries are continuing to arrange a number of valuable lectures to eater to a wide variety of tastes.

BOMBAY BRANCH

The Bombay Branch had another busy year with Sir Homi Mehta as President, and Prof. John Macken and Mr. S. K. Muranjan and later Mr. M. Sanjiva Rao as Joint Secretaries.

Eight meetings were held during the year; and the Local Council of the Branch met six times. Courses of lectures were also given to M.A. students of Statistics of the Bombay University by Professors Diwan, Macloan, Pandit and Sankpal. The Branch expressed its indebtedness to the authorities of the University School of Economics, the Royal Institute of Science and the Indian Merchants Chamber for the use of their premises for holding the meetings.

Arrangements for enquiry into the "Employment of Educated Persons" which could not be undertaken during 1940-41 were completed during the year. Sir Homi Mehta had kindly extended his usual generosity by agreeing to meet the expenses of the Enquiry. Prof. M. V. Pandit, B.Sc. (Born.) B.Sc. (Lond.) was appointed to conduct the enquiry and a Special Committee consisting of Prof. Anjaria, Prof. Macloan, Mr. K. M. Premchand, Dr. S. R. Savur, Prof. G. M. Sankpal and Prof. C. N. Vakil (Convenor) to direct it.

The Branch Committee regrets that the payment of subscriptions continued to be tardy. Special appeals addressed individually have not elicited any encouraging response. Although expenditure was kept down as much as possible, it is regretted that the financial position of the Breach is anything but satisfactory.

POONA BRANCH

Frof. V. O. Kale and Prof. D. O. Karve continued to be President and Local Secretary of the Branch supportively, and the membership strongth remained unchanged with ten life-members and two associates. Besides the members and associates several other persons interested in atatistical and allied work continend to be in touch with the Branch.

Most of the members had been sugged in important statistical work and they met often to exchange notes and discuss problems. Professors Gadgii and Karvo were engaged in the work of an economic enquiry in the Sangli State in the Southern Meratha Country. Statistics for the organisation of business in rural as well as urban areas in the State have been collected on an ortensive scale. Prof. Cadgil continued with his very valuable research in the fields of farm accounts and industrial organization. Prof. V. G. Gokhale continued to maintain detailed accounts for a farm which ha is running as a representative farming unit in the dry farming districts of the Decean.

MYSORE BRANCH

The Mysore Branch of the Lodian Statesteal Institute worked, as in previous years, in close cooperation with the teaching departments of the Mysore University. This year there was however increased:
academic contact with the newly opened Mathematical Association in the Maharaja's College. Interesting
topics were discussed—among them "Rationals of Approximation", "Conventions in Mathematica" and
"Inverso Probability" attrasted considerable discussion. Among the distinguished visitors was Dr. H.
J. Bhabha, F.R.S. During the year the Education Department of the Mysore Government deputed one
of their officers for special statistical training under Professor K. B. Madhava. Professor Madhava also
served during the year on a Committee appointed by the Mysore Government to enquire into the methods
of compliane and publishing Coat of Living Index in Bagantoes Civ.

MADRAS BRANCE

The President of the Branch, Prof. P. J. Thomas, was absent from Madras in concarion with his duties as the Chairman of the Cotton Textile Fact-finding Committee (Handloom and Milhs) during the year. In April 1941, Mr. N. Sundars Rama Sastry, the Secretary of the Branch, delivered a course of six lectures to the members of the Madras Teacher' Guild, on the application of statistical methods to education. A summary of these lectures was published in the "South India Teacher". He also delivered eight lectures to the research audeots in Economics and others interested in the subjects on Economic Statistics. As in previous years the work of the Branch was done in active co-operation with the Department of Economics of the University of Madras. This year the University recognized Statistics as an independent Department of Study and Research and started a Diploma Course in Statistics which attracted a large number of applications for admission.

LUCKNOW RELYCH

With the transfer of the Bureau of Economic Intelligence of the U. P. Government to Campore the Lacionov Branch which had not been functioning for a long time was recognized in November 1941 with Mr. N. C. Mehts, L.C.S. as President and Dr. Radsharand Mukerjee as Secretary. At the Inaugural Conference in November 1941 Dr. T. E. Gregory, Economic Adviser to the Government of India, spoke on curront affairs from the economic and statistical point of view. Prof. Radshakamal Mukerjee read an address on Statistics in the Service of Planning. Mr. N. C. Mehts the delivered his Provintial Address the subject of which was Statistics and Social Values. About sixteen papers were presented before the Conference by Mr. R. C. Shrivstateva, Prof. Radshakamal Mukerjee, Mr. J. K. Pande, Prof. N. N. Sen Gupte, Mr. S. C. Charvets Mr. S. C. Skatowa and others.

Lahors Branch: The Ron'ble Sir Manchar Lal and Dr. N. K. Besu continued as President and Secretary respectively.

PROPOSED NEW BRANCHES

At a meeting of the Council of the Institute held at Baroda on the 3rd January 1942 resolutions were passed requesting Dr. U. S. Nair, Dr. P. V. Sukhatma and Mr. A. C. Mukhorji to take necressary action for starting local Branches and appointing them as provisional Local Seventarios respectively at Trivundrum, Delhi and Baroda. It was also resolved that the rule requiring the minimum membership of ten members should be wrived in the case of three local Branches.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1941-42

SANERYA: THE INDIAN JOURNAL OF STATISTICS

Two issues of the Journal were published during the year. The Monotype machine received in January 1841 has helped us in overcoming difficulties experienced in making necessary typographical arrangements under the present war conditions. The bill of Ra. 26,164-60 net for the machine rus fully settled by September, a robate of Ra. 768/- having been secured for early settlement; but additional expenses to the extenit of about Ra. 2000/- had to be incurred for accessories and additional hypermatrices. It should be meetined in this connexion that the Oevermment of Inda had made a grant of Ra. 1,231 for the purpose and the Bengal Government one of Ra. 7,500. The presonal advance of Ra. 9,000 made by Prof. Mahakanobis for the purpose was partly repeal in the year; but additional advances were made by this the total outstanding amount due at the rend of the year being Ra. 2590-40.

EVACUATION ARRANGEMENTS

At the meeting of the Council held in Haroda on the 3rd January 1942, the question of evacuation and ARP. armagements was considered in great detail. In view of the possibility of the rooms occupied by the Institute in the Presidency College, Calcutta, baving to be released for ARP, no other work, it was devided to remove one portion of the Statistical Laboratory to the Honoury Necestary's genten house "Ammpali" at 81, Barrackpore Truth Road, in the suburb of Calcutta. It was also devided to remove another portion of the Laboratory including valuable books, records and instruments to Giridin where "Mahua", a house belonging to Mrs. Mahalanobis, would be made available for this purpose. The Government of Insia nanctioned a special grant of Ra. 12,000 and the Government of Bengal Ra. 3,000 for covariation arrangements. Develop permitting the Lustitute to use these two houses "Ammpali" and "Mahua" for the duration of war and subsequent one year without payment of any rent and to undertake necessary alteration and construction work for this purpose were approved by the Government of Insia in letter Na. F.11.741-E lated 14th March 1942 and by the Council on the 9th April 1942, and were executed by Prof. P. C. Mahalanobis and Mrs. Mahalanobis on the 9th April 1942, and were executed by

Evacuation to Giridih was started in January and was nearly completed by the end of March. As from the 14th April 1942 the distribution of work between Calcutta and Giridih has been as follows:

- (1). Theoretical Research: This section has been transferred to Giridih.
- (2). Training Course : There are two training courses here, one attended by offsees on depatation and the other by apprentices and advanced students. Both these sections have been shifted to Grindals and attempts would be made as and when necessary to make suitable arrangements for intending custidates regarding board and lodging.
- (3). Proieta: Statistical work on the schemes financed by the Imperial Council of Agricultural Research, Indian Central Jute Committee, Bengal Agricultural Department, and Conclona Cultivation, Mungpoo is being done at Ciridib. Work on schemes financed by the Bengal Board of Economic Enquiry is being curried on at both Oridib and Calculta.
- (4). Just Crasus Schrae 1942: The field office will be located in Calcutta, where the preparatory work on the statistical side will also be done. Tabulation and advanced analysis will be carried out both in Calcutta and Griefal.
- (5). Library: Most of the books have already been removed to Giridih and further details are given in an earlier section of this Report.
 - (6). Accounts Section: This will remain in Calcutta for the present.
- (7). Sankhyō, The Indian Journal of Statistics: The business office will remain in Calcutta but the editorial work will be carried on from Giridib.

MISCRILLANGOUS

During the year under review the Colculta University opened a Post-Graduate Department of Statistics; the Hennerry Secretary was appointed Honorary Hend of this Department; and lifth year cleans started in July 1941 with ten students. The Department is located in the Statistical Laboratory

and is working in close co-operation with the Institute; the locturers the gaselves are either old workers of the Laboratory who are still in touch with use or, as in the case of part-time lecturers, are whole-time employees of the Statistical Laboratory. Arrangements were made at the end of March to remove the Statistical Department to Giridib along with the Statistical Laboratory, and it is intended to continue loctures and practical classes during the summer vacation.

We are giad to note that two of our Vice-Presidents, the Hon ble Mr. N. R. Sarker and the Hon'ble Dr. S. P. Mockerjee took up the posts of Member-in-charge of the Department of Education, Health and Lands, Obvernment of India, and Finance Minister of the Government of Bergal respectively. We also note with pleasure that a knighthood was bestowed on Mr. Chunilal B. Mehts, one of the Life Members of the Institute.

JUTE CENSUS SCHEME 1942

- 7. Prof. P. C. Mahalanobia, Honorary Secretary placed before the meeting the following letter No. 151J dated 26th March, 1945 from Mr. Stevens, 1.C.S., Special Officer "Just", Government of Bengal, Calcutta, assertioning a grant of one lakh of ruppers for repeating the just ecessar section in 1942.
 - "I have to inform you that Government have been pleased to sanction the earrying out of an area creasus under juto in Bengal on the same lines and same seale as law year. I will request you to begin at once your preparations for this work and to submit as soon as passible detailed estimates of the cost of this area survey, which will of course be in addition to the yield survey which is being undertaken with funds provided jointly by Government and the Indian Central Jute Committee. The total cost of the area survey must not exceed Re. 1,00,000 (Ruppes one lakely) only."
- The Honorary Secretary reported that he had suggested to the Government of Bengal that this grant together with about Rs. 18,000 already sanctioned for crop-cutting work in 1942 should be handed over as a block grant to the Indian Statistical Institute on the following conditions:
- (i). The work will be done under the administrative centrel of a Joint Committee consisting of Mr. Stevens (representing the Government of Bengal, Chairman), Prof. Todd (Gort. of Bengal), Prof. Mahalanobis (Honorary Secretary of the Indian Statistical Institute and Statistical Advisor), and Mr. B.B. Das Gupta (representing Indian Central Jute Committee) as Secretary of the Joint Committee.
 - (ii). This Committee will have full authority to make necessary changes in the programme of work.
- (iii). The Indian Statistical Institute in consultation with the above Committee will have authority to make necessary reappropriations between different sections of the budget on condition that the total sanctioned grant is not exceeded.
- (ie). The Indian Statistical Institute will submit to Government a statement of account audited by Chartored Accountants, and surrender in due course the unspent balance of the block grant, if any.

Resolved that the action taken by the Honorary Secretary be approved and in case the block grant is associated by the Government of Bengal the Honorary Secretary be authorized to make new appointments, sanction allowances to workers of the Statistical Laboratory, and take all necessary action and incur necessary expenditure up to the limit of the block grant in connection with the area ceessus and crop-cutting works on jute in 1942.

REGREATION OF COMPUTING AND OFFICE STAFF

8. Prof. P. C. Mahalanobis, Honorary Secretary, stated that the question of the reorganization of the Institute staff had been in contemplation for some considerable time. The Honorary Secretary, had been given to understand that the question of stabilizing the Indian Statistical Institute would be taken.

up by the Government of India at an early date. The scales in the case of the higher technical staff would retrainly begin on a salary not less than Rs. 100. The Ronorary Secretary was therefore of opinion that the reorganization of the higher technical staff would have to wait necessarily until the Covernment of India reached a final decision regarding the future of the Institute.

As regards the computing section and office staff the starting salary would not accord fix. 100 per month. The Honorary Secretary thought that the reorganization of the computing section and office staff would be causer and was certainly more pressing. With a view to such reorganization all workers of the Statistical Laboratory had been advised to qualify themselves by passing the Institute examinations; and 62 workers appeared for the examination beld in August 1941 (which was confidenced by Prof. K. B. Madhava of Mysore and Mears. R. C. Bose and S. N. Roy) and 41 workers had passed in at least one section. In the case of the office staff also many of the workers had proved their worth by efficient and loyal service for a long time. The Honorary Secretary regretted that owing to his continued tils health from August to November 1941 and heavy pressure of evide in conceiving with ovacuation tarrangements subsequently he had not been able to submit any scheme so far. He was of opinion that it would be desirable to reorganise the computing section and the office atfalf at an early date. In view of the uncertainty regarding the financial position it would not be possible to make permanent or any long term appointments but be thought the best policy would be to adhere to certain minimum scales of salary in the case of qualified workers and be recommended two simple grades Rs. 33-475 and Re. 50-5100 for the presents.

- 8 (i). In view of the uncertain financial condition and also in view of the fact that the question of stabilities the Indian Statistical Institute is under consideration by the Government of India, the Council regrets that the reciganization of the higher technical staff of statisticians and assistant statisticians cannot be taken up until a final decision regarding the future of the Institute is made by the Government of India.
- (ii). Resolved that the recommendations of the Boonary Secretary to accepted, and that the computing acction and office staff to recognized on the basis of two scales of pay for qualified workers, namely, Ra.2-4-75 and Ra. 50-5-100, but in view of the uncertain financial position all appointments in the reorganized scale be made in the first instance for one year and terminable with two months' notice on either side; and the Bon. Secretary be requested to make detailed recommendations in this regard taking into consideration success institute examinations, duration of service in the Statistical Laboratory and other scademic and special qualifications.
- (iii). Resolved that all workers admitted before 30th April 1842 to any of the reorganized scases be permitted to join the Provident Fund scheme with retrospective offers and all persons appointed to any of the reorganized scales in future be permitted to join the Provident Fund Scheme from the date of Appointment.
- (iv). Resolved that the Honorary Secretary be authorized to make temporary appointments for not more than six months in the reorganized scales in the computing section and office staff in anticipation of sanction by the Council.

STATISTICAL CONTERENCE

- 9. Prof. P. C. Mahalanobia, Honorery Secretary, placed before the Council a latter dated 4th March, 1942 from Mr. N. Sundara Rama Sastry making various suggestions regarding future sessions of the Statistical Conference.
- (f). Resolved that the Council places on record its appreciation of the valuable suggestions made by Mr. N. Sundara Rama Sastry. The Council is of opinion that the possibility of arranging a joint session of the Statistical and Economic Conferences should be explored at the earliest opportunity.
- (ii). Also resolved that a Committee consisting of Prof. J. Maclean (Bombay), Dr. P. V. Sukhatme (New Dahls), the Honorary Scoretary (ex-officio) with Mr. N. Sundra Rams Sastry as Convence and Scoretary be appointed to take all incessary octator for inviting papers on a selected number of topies for being prosented before the next session of the Statistical Conference, and to hand over all papers accepted by the Committee for this purpose to the Honorary Scoretary not later than 31st Ostobar, 1942 for being printed and circulated before the opening session of the Statistical Conference.

PROCREDINGS OF THE COUNCIL

MIRCHILANGOUR

10. Read à letter dated 3rd April, 1942 from Mr. B. N. Datar together with a report thereon probared by the Honorary Secretary in which he stated that Mr. B. N. Datar joined the Statistical Laboratory on the 14th July 1940 and was given an interim ellowance of Rs. 100 p.m. by the Honorary Secretary, and was subsequently awarded a research fellowship by the Standing Research Committee of the Institute and a special allorance of Rs. 50 by the Honorary Secretary out of the carmarked and special enunity fund with retrospective effect; he was recommended by the Honorary Secretary for a statistical post in the office of the Consus Commissioner, Baroda and was granted leave without pay from 25th January 1941; he rejoined the Statistical Laboratory on the 11th August 1941, but was an exquently given leave for interviews for statistical posts in Campore and Bomba; : he left Calcutta on the 17th December 1941 on special leave to visit his relative in Bombay, and was on duty at Baroda in connexion with the Statistical Conference from 29th December 1941 to 6th January 1942; he took "advance" leave from 7th January to 17th Pehruary 1942 on argent private business, and immediately on his return to Calcutta he asked for permiseion to work in Giridih as he would not be able to work in Calcutta under present conditions; the Honoracy Secretary was unable to give any definite guarantee regarding the place of work but permitted him to go to Ciridih on 11th March, 1912 and assigned him the work of preparing a draft report on certain croc-cutting experiments; on 27th March, 1942 he saked for special leave for 4 days to go to Bombay to bring his wife to Cirillin; the Honorary Secretary, who had in the meantime (27th March, 1942) received instructions from the Covernment of Bengal to proceed with the jute census scheme this year, recalled all senior workers to Calculta and informed Mr. Datar on the 29th March that in view of the heavy pressure of work in connecon with the Jute Census Schome it was likely that he would have to work in Calcutta in the immediate future. On the 30th March the Honorary Secretary was informed by Mr. K. Raghavan Nair, Joint Secretary. that Mr. Datar had been probably called for an interview for a statistical post electrore; the Honorary Secretary immediately informed Mr. Datar at Giridib that there was no objection to his going for an interview but the Honorary Secretary would like to know whether Mr. Datar had applied for a statistical post ebewhere without the knowledge of the Honorary Secretary. Mr. Datar came to Cabutta on the 2nd April when he was informed by the Henorary Secretary that he would have to work in Calcutta for the present. Mr. Datar resigned his post in his letter of the 3rd April (Good Priday) from which date he ceased to attend the Statistical Laboratory, without handing over charge or scoing the Honorary Secretary; and in his letter of the 5th April (Sunday) stated that he would leave Calcutta on the same day. The Honorary Secretary mentioned that certain statements in Mr. Datar's letter of the 3rd April were not correct, for example, the Honorary Secretary had never promised to give him a permanent post on Rs. 200-500. The Honorary Secretary also pointed out that Mr. Datar did not submit periodic returns of work done by him in accordance with standing instructions which were complied with regularly by all other senior workers.

After a careful review of the case the Council notes with regret that many of the statements made in file Data's letter are not exerced; r-that the language used in his letter is highly objectionable; that he filed to authmit periodic reports on the work done by him; that he ceased to attend the Statistical Laboratory without notice or without handing over charge and without siliuting the "advance" lever of 25 days taken by him in January 1842. The Council is not prepared to accept Mr. Data's claim to have the right to apply for poste directly obserview without informing the Honorary Secretary and is also not prepared to ontortain his claim of choosings his place of work. In view of the fart that he ceased attenuing the Statistical Laboratory from 2rd April, 1842 without notice and without handing over charge and also without submitting any reports as to the work done by him in connection with various projects allotted to him, resolved that Mr. It. N. Datar be considered as having loft the service of the Instituto without notice from the 3rd April 1842, and the whole of the employer's share of the Treviolent Fund centribution be forfeted.

- I am directed by the Council of the Indian Statistical Institute to apply for a special grant of Rs. 12,000 for A.R.P. arrangements and safe custody of the Library and other equipment of the Statistical Laboratory.
- 2. The total number of indexed volumes in the Library is about 11,000, but counting reparately different parts of the same volume, the total number would be about 10,000. Besides the library the Statistical Laboratory possesses origical records relating to various statistical enquires, activating machines and other equipment. The estimated value of the library and other equipment is about one lakh and thirty thousand represent. This, however, is not the most important point. The library contains muter books and demplete series of poirmais and reports and over one thousand reprints of scientific papers which it will be difficult, if not impossible, to reduce in each loss or disance of loss or disance of loss or disance of loss or disance of loss or disance.
- 3. The Statistical laboratory is housed at present in one portion of the Presidency College and in hired rooms in the neighbourhood. We shall need about Rs. 1000 for such days, situry-pumps and other immediate A.P., arrangements in Galestria; and about Rs. 2000 for packing, fright and other expenses for removal. The total cost is thus estimated to come to about Rs. 13,000, but may be highest figures into appreciatory before the work is completed.
- 7. In the absence of any reserve fund we have no other alternative but to approach the Government of India with the request for a non-recurring grant of Rs. 12,000 on condition that we shall undertake to provide Rs. 5,000 from other sources. In view of the energying we have the beason further to pray that this grant should be noted available as soon as possible in the current financial year.
- (ii) The Honorary Secretary reported that the Covernment of India had sanctioned a special grand
 in letter No. F. 41-7/41-E dated 20th February, 1942. (copy annexed)

- With reference to your letter No. D/46/42, dated the 30th Junuary 1942. I am directed to convey the auction of the Governor General in Council to the payment to you of a special great of Rs. 12,000 (Rupeet twelve thousand only) to cover two thirds of the expenditure on air-raid pressuriors for the premises of the Indiana Statistical Institute and evacuation of the lithrary and equipment of the Institute to asker places outside Calcuta. The grant is powhle from the budget great of the Central Government or 1941-42 under "Demand No. 37-other Scientific Departments: India: B. Granta-maid and Donations to Scientific Societies and Institutes" and should be drawn from the Accountant General, Central Revenues before the Jatist March 1942.
- 2. I am to request that an endired statement of the expenditure mentioned in paragraph i above may be submitted to the Government of India in due course. I am to add that if the amount of actual expensive is less than the amount of Rs. 15.000 estimated by you, the difference between the special grant of Rs. 15.000 paid to the institute and two-thirds of the actual expenditure will be delected from the greats payable to the Institute from central revocess in 1942-45.
- (iii) The Hon. Scenstary reported that he had made arrangements for banding over to the Institute 100 sep, feet as "Annepah", 67 Harrackpore Trunk Road with effect from 15th March 1942 and he hoped to be able to hard over about an additional 2000 sep, feet in the course of air weeks.
- (iii) A portion of the Statistical Laboratory including valuable books and records, calculating machines, photographic apparatus etc. had been removed to Giridih and a staff of about 20 persons were already working there. Some more workers would be sent to Giridih in the course of the next fortaight. In view of uncertain conditions arrangements were being made for storing a certain amount of essential foodstuff, oil sto. at Giridih.
- (v) A.R.P. arrangements for both Calcutta and Giridih were being speeded up. Sand-bags, stirrup pumpe, first-aid boxes had been purchased, and a number of computers were being trained in A.R.P. work.
- (m) Dr. H. Sinha reported that several members of the staff of the Indian Statistical Institute and of the Statistical Laboratory were experiencing financial difficulty for removing their families from Calcutta. Advances had been granted by many institutions in Calcutta including the University for this purpose. It was decirable to provide similar facilities to the staff of the Indian Statistical Institute and of the Statistical Laboratory. Mr. K. N. Chalcuturativ supported the proposal.

Resolved that Rs. 100, or one month's milary or the amount of member's own contribution to the Provident Fund, whichever is less, he advanced to every member of the Statistical Workers' Provident Fund, applying for the loan, on his excenting the following document:

"I do hereby bind myself, my heirs, successors, or assigns to refund Rs..... being the amount drawn in advance by me on or such part of it as remains unpaid in the event of my leaving service or thing before the advance is repaid in full. I further agree that the amount may also be recovered by the Indian Statistical Institute from any sum that might be found due to me."

Such advance to be recoverable in ten equal monthly instalments out of his salary, with effect from the beginning of the month subsequent to the advance.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNCIL.

3 (rii). The Hon. Secretary reparted that as he had not yet fully recovered from his illness and was still having a temperature he had applied for leave for ait works from the Presidency College from the record wred of March and he intended to go to Girlish immediately to look after leave arrangements. He also intended to spend the summer vacation at Girlish as that he himself would be able to look after the work of Girlish. As the Honorary Secretary was likely to be absent from Calcutta for a long time he considered it desimble to appoint a spreial officer who would be prepared to remain in responsible charge of the work in Calcutta oven in an energency. In this connection he suggested the name of Atindranath Bose who was one of the senior workers of the Statistical Laboratory and a Research Fellow of the Institute for nearly three years, but had left the fruittitute for lactuate, and to remain in Calcutta during the period of emergency. He used to get a pay of Ra, 175 at the time he left the Laboratory.

Resolved that Atindranath Bose he appointed Assistant Secretary in charge of work in Calcutta, and that he he authorized to assume full control as Branch Secretary and to receive all the powers of the Honorary Secretary under emergency conditions (with effect from such date as may be considered necessary by the Honorary Secretary) on a malary of Rs. 1751- per month plus an administrative allowance of Rs. 751- per month as long as he remains in charge of work in Calcutta.

MISCELLANGOUS

- Considered the following letter dated 3rd March, 1942 from Naresh Chandra Mukerjee, steno-typist, reporting a loss of Ra.147/- from office cash.
 - I have the honour to place before you the fact that while travelling with Professor Mahalamshis in the Bombay Mali leaving Howards on the 16th January 1942! I was reabled of Ex. 1477, out of Rs. 15t which was landed over to me from office for expense storing the tour. I found the reak in tack before I went to be on the night of 16th January just after Item's Station. On the following morning at Kalyan I discoved to my amazement that all the notes totalling By. 147! were missing from my pure but the small miss where kept in a separate section with zipfasteners as well as the railway ticket were not couched. I indicate the matter to Prefessor Mahalamshis on our arrival at Bombay station and reported the matter to the Rail way Police Station, Bombay Viction Termius on the same day.
 - I am a poor employee with a small subary. It will be the greatest handship on me, if I am required to pay off the money from my own malary. I was robbed in spite of the usually good prevaints that I take while travelling with Lattoristory money and property. I hope, therefore, in view of the above nirumstances, and in consideration of my peat loyal services to the featistate, the frastitute will kindly relieve me form the reponability of paring off this amount.

Resolved that the whole amount of Rs. 147/- be written off, but this not to be considered a precedent.

5. The Honorary Secretary recommended an increment of pay to Krishnudas Gupta who had been appointed, on the unanimous recommendation of a Selection Committee, as Assistant Secretary on a pay of Rs. 1751-per month in May 1941. Ho was doing excellent work; and would remain in administrative charge of the Giridin centre. He resigned a post on Rs. 250/- as General Secretary, The Costral Secretarist of Associations. (Calcutta) and his successor was guiting Rs. 400/- per month at present.

Resolved that he be given an increment of Rs. 75/- with effect from January 1942.
