PART I: GENERAL REVIEW OF THE WORK DONE DURING THE YEAR

1. GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

1.1. Membership: During the year 1973-74, no one was elected by the Council as ordinary member. The membership of 8 members was terminated in terms of Rule 3.1 of the Rules of the Institute. Three ordinary members became life members. Three ordinary members resigned, membership of one ordinary member was revived, and according to information available in the Institute, one life member and 2 ordinary members died.

Thus the membership position as on 31 March 1974 was 355 (249 ordinary, 95 life, 4 honorary life and 7 institutional members).

During the year 1973-74, 111 sessional members and 185 student members were enrolled for one year.

1.2. General Meetings

1.10. Obituary

Professor S. N. Base: The adjourned Annual General Meeting held on 30 March 1974 mourned the sad demise of Professor S. N. Bose, President of the Indian Statistical Institute, who passed away on 4 February 1974. The following resolution was adopted:

This adjourned Annual General Meeting of the Indian Statistical Institute places on record its deep sense of sorrow and bereavement at the passing away of National Professor S. N.

Bose, a noble Indian and an eminent scientist. The Institute had the privilege of close association for nearly 30 years with Professor S. N. Bose who was a life-long friend of the late Professor P. C. Mahalanobis. A genius who had contributed to the understanding of Nature through the well-known Bose-Statistics, Professor Bose had always stood by the Institute in making its growth possible.

Professor S. N. Bosc became a member of the Institute in 1934 and was elected honorary life member in 1948. His association with the affairs of the Institute was so close that Professor Bose had become its executive head as Secretary from 1946 to 1948. As Vice-President, Vice-Chairman and finally as President since 1967, Professor Bose remained officially associated with the Institute till his death.

Professor Bose's range of vision and involvement spread over almost all branches of science, physics, chemistry, biology, mathematics, etc., as well as literature, art and music.

The development of science in the country and various cultural aspects of this city bears the indelible imprint of Professor Bose.

Professor Bose devoted a great part of his illuminating mind and innate sympathy for the dissemination of scientific knowledge in the Bengali language, so that scientific education can have unfettered growth.

This meeting conveys its deep sense of grief to his bereaved family.

1.11. Review Committee: N.S.S. Take-over and Reorganisation: It was repotted in the previous Annual Report (1972-73), that the NSS work along with its staff had been taken over by the Government of India on 1 June 1972. The previous Annual Report (1972-73) also reported that the Governing Body and Council deliberated on the proposals for restructuring on 26 March 1973 and the proposals were also discussed in the adjourned Annual General Meeting on 27 March 1973.

The Council of the Institute and the Governing Body of the Research and Training School deliberated on the proposals for restructuring of the Institute in their meetings held on (1) 6-7 July 1973; (2) 30 October 1973; (3) 29 December 1973, and (4) 16-17 March 1974.

In the meetings on 16 and 17 March, proposals regarding the Memorandum of Association and Regulations were formulated in detail after considering different views.

1.12. Land and Construction: There was no major construction during the year under review. Certain important developments, however, took place as described below:

Baranagar: (i) In May 1973, 52 MT of 22 mm. steel rounds were purchased for the construction of the library building.

(ii) The Council of the Institute in its meeting dated 6-7 July 1973 decided to terminate the earlier arrangements about construction and the Works Committees for Baranagar and Delhi were converted as Advisory Committees. The Secretary was vested with the executive responsibilities about the construction. In accordance with the decision of the Council meeting dated 6-7 July 1973, a reputed firm of architects (Messrs. Ballardie Thompson & Mathews Co. Ltd.) was appointed as the architect for the construction of the library building. An agreement was finalised on 20 August 1973 with the architect for the construction of a composite library building.

- (iii) On 30 December 1973, the Council appointed a Works Advisory Committee to submit proposals about the construction of the Baranagar complex. The Works Advisory Committee formulated its proposals for the construction of the proposed multi-storied library building and these were considered by the Council on 13 February 1974.
- (iv) The sketch plan prepared by the architects for the first phase of the library building was forwarded to the Government for approval.
- (*) Soil investigation was carried out at the proposed site by an expert firm, Shri K. N. Dadina, selected by calling open tenders.

Delhi: The construction of a group of buildings of the Institute at Delhi commenced in the early part of the financial year 1973-74 at the 14.76-acre plot of the Institute land off Mehrauli Road near Hauz Khas. The buildings currently under construction are the faculty offices, library, dormitory, class rooms and kitchen, comprising a total carpet area of about 60,000 square feet and costing an estimated Rs. 32 lakks.

2. RESEARCH AND TRAINING SCHOOL

The Research and Training School carried out its training and research activities under the guidance of the Director, Professor M. Mukherjee.

The statisticians at Calcutta carried out research, conducted teaching programmes and provided consultation service to other scientists.

2.1. Training Programmes

2.1.1. Admission to Courses: A new course, the one-year regular course on Statistical Craftsmanship, was started during the 1973-74 session at the Calcutta centre. A full list of the courses is given in the Prospectus of Degrees, Diplomas and Certificates, 1973-74. No summer course was held during the year.

- 2.2.1. Important Topics of Research: The research work of the Institute during April 1973—March 1974 is embodied in a large number of research papers sent for publication, besides mine ographed technical reports. The fields of research covers, besides statistics and mathematics, various subjects for which the Institute has specialised research units—anthropometry and human genetic, biochemistry, biometry, botany, chemistry, computer science, crop science, demography, documentation and library science, embryology, economics and econometrics, geology, leaf protein, linguistic research, spechometry, sociology, survey research, theoretical physics and electronics. B. APPLIED STATISTICS, SURVEYS AND COMPUTING

Computer Science

During the year, the Computer Science Unit (CSU) carried on its programme of training, research projects, consultation and service in applied statistics, surveys and computing.

Training: Apart from the courses taught to regular B. Stat. and M. Stat. degree students, the CSU organises the following special courses: (f) One-year Advanced Studies leading to Diploma in Computer Science; (if) Ten-week Intensive Course on Programming and Application of Electronic Computers; and (iii) Specialisation courses in applied statistics/sample surveys/computer

programming and application for second-year M. Stat. students. The members of the staff also assist other organisations in their training programmes.

Three trainees completed the one-year course of advanced studies and submitted dissertations to qualify for the Diploma in Computer Science. Five and three trainees joined the advanced studies course on computer science and applied statistics respectively. Seven students of the M. Stat. second-year course were given specialised training in sample surveys and computer programming. Twentytwo trainees joined the ninth session of the latensive Course on Programming and Application of Electronic Computers, held from 5 November 1973 to 11 January 1974; 19 were awarded certificates of merit and 3 certificates of attendance.

Research: Research was conducted in the development of new computer methods for applied statistical work. Work was also done in updating and maintaining the software packages of the Honewell 400 computer system.

Survey Project: A survey on Some Aspects of Family Planning in Calcutta, 1973-74 was conducted from December 1973 to March 1974. Information was collected from 1417 households sampled, using a two-stage procedure, with urban blocks as the first stage according to a circular systematic sampling scheme with different probabilities, and households as second-stage units. A few novel features of the design were: (1) Use of a master sample of urban blocks to ensure self-weighting as well as equal distribution of work load; (2) Interpenetration in two stages to ensure validity of estimate of sampling error as well as assessment of non-sampling errors; and (3) Use of a project network and critical path approach to control field operations.

Consultation: Statistical consultation and computation services were provided to scientists within and outside the Institute and covered topics in agriculture, biology, medicine, flood research. psychology etc.

Psychometry

Validity studies for selections in the Hindusthan Aeronautics Limited and Hindusthan Steel Limited.

Collection of data and corresponding analysis to ascertain the construct validity of Non-Language Tests of Verbal Intelligence.

Studies dealing with neuroticism. environmental conditions and delinquency, and social prejudice.

The Psychometric Research and Service Unit rendered technical service to public sector organisations like the Indian Telephone Industries Ltd., Fertiliser Corporation of India, Bharat Aluminium Co., Ltd. and some private sector organisations like the TELCO.

C. PHYSICAL AND EARTH SCIENCES

Computer Development, Electronics and Communication Science: The work of the Computing Machines and Electronics Laboratory during the year may be broadly classified under the following groups: (1) Theoretical Research, (2) Experimental Research, and (3) Training.

Important topics of theoretical research were on the following:

Hydroclone Model; Electro-chemical machining problem; Flame stabilization in a rectangular cavity; Determination of normal burning velocity in pre-mixed gaseous mixture;

Mathematical model of the propagation of waves in shallow channels and interlacing channels; Switching circuits and fault diagnosis; Applied probability and numerical analysis; Generation of music by Honeywell 400 computer.

Computers' Memory Techniques: This is one of the continuing research projects of the laboratory on which more than 30 research papers were published in India and abroad. Extensive studies, both theoretical and experimental, have been made on magnetic down and magnetic core. The system design on associative and distributive type of memories with Non-Destructive Readout were studied. Work has been undertaken on some new memory technology such as thin film and solid state memory. The properties of error correcting codes and improving the memory reliability of the computer is being extensively studied.

Speech Processing, Pattern Recognition, Learning Machines and Statistical Methods: The application of statistical method in Pattern Recognition problems has a tremendous potentiality in man-machine communication problem. The work in this field is divided into two sub-groups namely, (a) Acoustic Phonetics, and (b) Pattern Recognition. Studies on acoustic phonetic parameters of Indian languages viz. Bengali, Hindi and Telugu, were completed successfully. The statistical behaviour of different acoustic parameters in relation to machine recognition of speech sound was studied. An elaborate programme on machine recognition of handwritten characters with the H-400 Computer was undertaken. Fifteen research papers were published in this field in Indian and foreign journals. Further studies on psycholinguistic and neurophysiological aspects have been undertaken to understand the basic recognition mechanism of the human system. Studies on automata theory and brain models are being undertaken.

Digital Communication Techniques: This is a new field on which work was started last year. The scheme comprises theoretical work on coding theory, switching theory and digital filtering. More than four papers were communicated. Some experimental work on digital communication system was undertaken to study the noise effects in communication system.

Computer Peripherals: A 350-character per second paper tape recorder was developed.

Work is continuing on further modification to the equipment.

Mini Computer: The work on the mini computer is in progress.

Training and Research Guidance

In the Electronics and Communication Science Unit, fresh engineers and post-graduate students are given training every year in the advanced topics of computer technology. Six B. Tech students from the Calcuta University received practical training for two months on advanced electronic circuitry; three final-year students of the B.E. College successfully completed practical training for six weeks in digital techniques.

Shri Jyotirmoy Das, M. Tech, submitted his Ph.D. thesis on "The properties of ferromagnet materials and their application in information handling and storage systems" with the Calcutta University under the guidance of Dr. Dutta Maiumder.

Chemistry

A comparative study on the adsorbality of different cationic dyes on bentonite, kaolinite and illite.

Selective adsorption of dyes from solution of dye mixtures.

Grade desorption of dyes held in double-layer adsorption on clay-surface with the help of quaternary ammonium cations.

Geology

The integrated programme of geological research in the Pranhita-Godavari Valley continued under the following heads:

Sedimentology and tectonics of the Precambrians. Sedimentology of the Gondwanas. Palaentology and stratigraphy of the Gondwanas.

Family-oriented health problems in Calcutta.

The programme of study of recent sedimentary deposits of the Usri river, near Giridih (Bihar) launched in 1970-71, was continued. The study is providing information on the precise mechanism of transportation and deposition of fluvial sediments in nature.

D. BIOLOGICAL SCIENCES

Anthropometry and Human Genetics

Genetic studies of human placental enzymes, in collaboration with the B. J. Medical College, Poona.

Study of biochemical polymorphism amongst different tribes of Andhra Pradesh (Telengana area) in collaboration with the National Laboratory, Hyderabad, and the Ranchi University.

Study of developmental genetics of the production of lactate dehydrogenase in the human system, in collaboration with the Department of Anthropology, Calcutta University.

Biosocial problems of sex ratio at birth by parity and region and first birth interval by social class in India.

Biosocial problems of fertility, reproductive wastage and population in general in India.

Genetical problems in dermatoglyphics in the rural population in Haiti, West Indies, and

also in the Gavda population of Maharashtra.

Scrological, biochemical and biosocial investigation among the Nandiwalas, a nomadic group of Maharashtra. Population genetics of the Parsis—an endogamous group.

Biochemistry

Investigations are being carried out on the level of beta-carotene contents of different edible green leaves.

The plant Cassia tora is being investigated for the isolation of active principles.

Blometry

Design of micro and macro level survey on blood chemistry and hematology to investigate into the causes of atherosclerosis in young and old age.

Survey and experiments on biological species on growth, survival, aging and disease.

Botany

Intra-specific and inter-specific interactions in crop plants.

Mechanisms of plant interactions.

Ecology and behaviour of field rodents.

Estimation of pre-harvest loss of rice due to field rodents.

Crop Science

Study of asymmetrical structures in plants and animals.

Explorative work in the family palmae (Arecaceae).

Morphological study including the process of germination on juvenile palms was extended to their sub-families. Germinating seeds of Salacca edults (lepidocaryoideae) obtained from Indonesia are being studied.

Investigation of anatomical structures of the vegetative and reproductive parts of different palm species under the above-mentioned sub-families.

Study on the association of foliar spirality and the aestivation of flowers with the yield of fruits on some species of Malvaceae.

Some trials on tissue culture work to explore the possibility of effecting clonal propagation in economically important palms.

In order to study the reproductive behaviour of the coconut robber crab, Birgus latro, a second expedition in collaboration with a German scientist, Dr. R. Altevogt, was sent to the Andaman Islands.

Presence of divine proportion in human figures of Indian and German nationalities.

Embryology

Further studies on transcription, translation and metabolism of sulphur compounds in Limnaea (mollusca) were conducted. DNA synthesis has also been studied and it was found that the arrest of embryonic mitosis in Limnaea by Phytohaemagglutinin, a plant protein, is due to its inhibitory action on DNA-synthesis. The particular site of action of PHA on DNA is now being investigated.

In order to study the behaviour of marine animals, an expedition was conducted in the Andaman Islands. Slides and movie films were made on marine animals.

Leaf Protein

Screening of local vegetation and aquatic plants including water weeds.

Statistically designed observations are being conducted to establish preliminary observations in the study of optimal conditions in eight crops.

Study of annual yield of extracted protein per unit area.

Work on stability to B-carotene content in Leaf Protein Concentrate (L.P.C.).

E. SOCIAL SCIENCES

Economic Research

The Economic Research Unit (ERU) is mainly concerned with applied economic studies on problems of planning and economic development, besides methodological studies in mathematical economics and econometrics. With the help of the National Income Research Unit, the ERU also shoulders the responsibility of teaching economics and econometrics in B. Stat., M. Stat., and other courses of the Research and Training School, and the International Statistical Education Centre. The ERU also organises an advance course in economics and econometrics leading to the Ph.D. degree of the Institute. Three students besides one student from Bangladesh were admitted to the advanced course during the year.

An important activity of the Unit is the holding of seminars and discussions. Seven seminars by visiting scientists were organised during the year.

The scientific workers continued to work on problems of economic development. Particular emphasis was laid on the problems of growth of West Bengal and the eastern region of the
country. Towards the end of the year, the Unit undertook a project sponsored by the Planning
Commission for analyzing the interdependence of transport, power, coal and steel in the eastern
region. Work has already been started for collecting and collating the necessary information from
the agencies involved in planning and implementing the various programmes. The study may help
in formulating concrete proposals for removing the bottlenecks hindering the industrial progress
of this important region.

Studies in demand analysis were continued, chiefly based on NSS budget data. Extensive investigation was started on the effects of the degree of monetization of household income on household consumption patterns.

A macro-econometric model of the Indian economy was constructed for examining the behaviour of prices.

As regards the data collected through the survey of industrial labour in the Greater Calcutta area, some tabulation was completed for the engineering workers in the sample. The analysis of the entire data on the electronic computer in the ISI was started.

The studies on inter-regional disparities in the level of living were continued (jointly with the NIRU). Among new lines of research undertaken may be mentioned a study of inter-industrial and inter-regional wage differentials in India, a mathematical analysis of decentralization procedures in planning, and an examination of relative efficiencies of television and film shows in mass education.

National Income Research

The National Income Research Unit (NIRU), Calcutta, is concerned with analytical studies on national income and its several distributions. The studies entail, among other things, botaining estimates that are not available in official statistics, working out interrelations among relevant variables and furnishing thereby explanations of the growth of the Indian economy.

The main items of research work during the period are as follows: (1) Estimates of national income, (2) National accounts, (3) Studies on the development of West Bengal and the eastern

region (comprising four eastern States) of India, (4) Inter-regional and inter-temporal variation in consumer prices and levels of living, (5) Estimates of net domestic product at current prices for some specific years, (6) Degree of monetization-variation between States, (7) Impact of indirect taxes on the size and other distributions of the levels of living, (8) Level of living after taxation and benefits.

A subject-wise bibliography of all the papers submitted to the conferences on national income in India was prepared. Some methodological studies are also in progress.

Particular attention is being paid to national income estimates of West Bengal, other bordering States and Bangladesh. A second project is a continuing research survey on national income. A national accounting framework for developing countries is also being devised.

The NIRU participated in the teaching programme of the Research and Training School and the International Statistical Education Centre; subjects taught were economic development, economic statistics, econometrics, and national income. Arrangements were also made for the specialisation of students of the International Statistical Education Centre, for research work leading to dissertation for workers already qualified for M. Stat and studies leading to certain papers for PhD, students, Research supervision continued to be an activity of the Unit.

Sociology

Some steps were taken toward the maximisation of the use of accumulated and generating data-sets on social sciences; and a Data Centre has started functioning.

A research scheme elucidating Content Analysis on societal change in India was prepared.

A Directory on Social Science Institutes in India is being prepared.

A study on the problems and possibilities of utilization of N.S.S. data (1-19 rounds) was undertaken.

An exploratory enquiry into the socio-economic structure and change in some villages around Sriniketan, Birbhum, was completed.

The following exploratory studies are in progress:

Pilgrim Centres-Puri (Orissa); Hardwar and Rishikesh (Uttar Pradesh); Tarakeshwar (West Bengal).

Socio-economic polarization.

Social communication and development in several selected backward/non-backward regions of India.

The final report on the study of variation in family structures in West Bengal was prepared.

The transcription of data relating to 80,000 family and non-familial units in India in 1961-62, for computer analysis, is underway at Giridih.

A field survey on "Working class consciousness" was completed in collaboration with the Faculty of Sociology, University of Bielefeld, Federal Republic of Germany.

Data collected from several towns of West Bengal on the impact of conurbation areas upon the fringe-society, was analysed.

The transcribed information of the socio-economic data of 1876 villages consisting of 85.613 households surrounding Giridih town (Bihar) is now in the punching stage.

The following research projects are in progress: (f) A study of Gooroodas Banerjee and his times, (fi) Nepal's experiment with nation-building.

Researches were completed to prepare designs and programmes on: secondary analysis of family structures; nuclearization of joint family structures; social research on contemporary India: levels of social integration in rural areas; and sociology of education. West Bengal.

The Round Table Discussion on the Sociology of National and Regional Movements was held the auspices of the Sociology Research Unit, 26-27 October 1973, as preparatory to the forthcoming World Congress of Sociology.

Pre-Census Population Studies

The Pre-Census Population Studies Unit is carrying on the following projects:

Pre-census population studies: The work on the analysis of the data presented in the draft Report on the Population Estimates of India, Vol. 3. 1811-1820 (with additional material for 1821-1830) submitted to the Registrar-General, India, continued, along with the usual work of compilation of past population data for the period 1801-1810 and 1831-1840. During the year, work on the following items progressed considerably: (a) Construction of decennial population estimates for each region of India for the period 1801-1961; (b) A study of the movement of factors determining a population size; (c) Population changes in Bengal, Bihar and Orissa, 1771-1971 (a technical report was drafted); (d) A note on the changes in the urban characteristics of the eastern region of India and Bangladesh, 1811-1830 and 1872-1971; (e) The population trend of Assam valley, 1814-1961; and (f) A note on Calcutta, a dying city, an outline of population history, 1600-1971.

A Socio-economic bibliography of India from the remote past up to date: Some additions were made in the checklist of the bibliographical material in addition to the cataloguing of about 350 publications of the ainteteenth century.

Dr. Francis Buchanan during 1807-1814. Information on the tract available in settlement reports and other paneers for the subsequent period was searched and servations.

Analysis of the quantitative socio-economic information of the mineteenth century to indicate changes up-to-date: In the course of searches for information in libraries and archives in India and abroad, colourful data which throw a flood of light on the recent past of the country are discovered. Attempts are being made to trace changes up to date in the geographical tract where any significant set of socio-economic information might be available in the early or middle of the mineteenth century in order to strengthen our understanding of the present. Some of the topics on which work has progressed are as follows:

and post of poverty and hunger in India 1807-1973, a methodological survey and historical and post; socio-economic changes of village groups in the Punjab and Uttar Pradesh; prices and wages in Bengal, 1700-1971; and evolution of statistical organisation and methodology in Indian socio-economic surveys, 1770-1900.

Historical statistical atlas based on the contemporary maps of past surveys: During the year micro-film negatives of 86 non-restricted and 62 restricted maps of the surveys conducted during 1826-1830 were released by the Government of India for appropriate use and publication by the Pre-Census Population Studies Unit. These maps cover several tracts from Hissar District (Punjab) to Gorakhpur District (Uttar Pradesh). A sketch of surveyed tracts of the Delhi-Punjab area in 1826-1830 was super-imposed on the 1961 maps to identify the villages for which socio-conomic and topographical data were available. Some other district maps were prepared, illustrating the socio-conomic data of Buchanar's survey.

Family Planning Research

Research is conducted in measures of family planning communication programme. The programme of work includes (I) Surveys, (II) Research in family planning, and (III) Preparation of reports, research papers, communication literature, charts, maps and exhibits.

The activities of the Unit during the year were related to the following new and continuing projects:

Project I: Calcutta City Project.

Title of the Study: A post-CAR Survey: An Evaluation of Communication Action Research (CAR) programme in Calcutta city.

The major object of the study was to assess post knowledge, attitude, practice and fertility levels of the couples. The population consisted mainly of the lower middle class. Nine hundred seventyfive couples maintained active status during the period of survey. The over-all couple fertility rate declined from 160.8 to 125.8 during the programme period and stayed almost constant (125.9) in the post-CAR period.

Project II: Hooghly Fertility Studies II.

Title of the Study: Some demographic measurements in the Hooghly District, West Bengal.

The main object of the study was to estimate some parameters suitable for describing the prevalent demographic situation in the district.

A representative sample of the general population of the district in both the rural and urban sectors was studied. 2,735 couples in the rural areas and 1,093 in the urban areas could be interviewed for the study. The crude birth rate in the district had declined from 40.2 per mille in 1966.

Project III: A study of abortions in Calcutta city hospitals. The study has been undertaken to explore the socio-economic and demographic characteristics and motivational factors of women undergoing abortion. Data from three hospitals were collected.

All the research papers in connection with the studies conducted on the Communication and Action Research (CAR) programme in Calcutta and Hooghly, have been summarised and will be mimeographed as a booklet.

A bulletin was published containing the growth, development and activities of the CAR centre since its inception.

The Medical Termination of Pregnancy Act (1971) was translated from English into Bengali and submitted to the Government of India.

Linguistic Research

Study of the phonetic structure of Indian languages, and the application of results (Telugu, Benzali, Hindi, and Sanskrit).

Investigation of problems relating to the structure of meaning (speech sound features in the phonetic structure of Indian Baquages, behaviour of speech sounds in isolated dictionary entry words, stability of speech sounds).

A statistical approach to linguistic problems (Bengali, Hindi, Telugu, and Serbo-Croatian).

The following seminars were organised by the Linguistic Research Unit:

Seminar on Linguistics, 11-17 January 1974, Indian Statistical Institute, Calcutta.

Seminar on Telugu Phonetics, 20-21 February 1974, Hyderabad (Co-sponsor: Osmania University).

Seminar on Speech Habilitation of Hard-of-Hearing-Children, 22 February, Hyderabad (Co-sponsor: Osmania University).

Demography

Calcutta Fertility Survey 1970.

Socio-economic and demographic correlates of marriage pattern in India, 1961.

Trends and variations in Indian nuptiality: A cohort study.

Examination of birth rates estimated by National Sample Survey and Sample Registration System.

Examination of the progress of family planning programme in India.

Planning and Regional Survey

The research work of the Planning and Regional Survey Unit, New Delhi, covered a wide spectrum spanning quantitative work relating to the structure of the Indian economy to theoretical work on optimum growth. As in earlier years, most of the work built on and continued previous research in areas such as input-output analysis, production functions, consumer demand, international economics, income distribution, regional planning and agricultural economics.

Project work: The work was completed on the project, Exchange Control Liberalization and Economic Development, undertaken by T. N. Srinivasan jointly with J. N. Bhagwati, Massathusetts Institute of Technology, under a grant from the National Bureau of Economic Research (NBER). The results are to be published in the form of a monograph by the NBER.

The work on "Optimal Fertilizer Demand" undertaken on contract with the Fertilizer Association of India was completed. A summary report was issued in January 1974.

The work on the research project on area development in the Karnal District (Haryana), inanced by the Indian Council for Social Science Research (ICSSR), was completed. A report cuitled, "Central place hierarchy for a developing region—Karnal area case study" was prepared.

A study entitled, "Settlement structure and space relations—a study of functional organizations in Karnal district" was completed by A. N. Sharma. He was awarded the M.Phil degree (Jawaharlal Nehru University) on the basis of the study. Preliminary work was carried out on the formulation of a research outline for the study of market towns and spatial development in Haryana.

A one-year project on "The Anatomy of Poverty and Unemployment in Rural India" was initiated by P. K. Bardhan under a grant from the ICSSR.

Under a fellowship from the ICSSR, the work on a book, "Contractual Relations in Indian Agriculture and their Effects on Productivity and Employment" was initiated by A. Rudra from I January 1974.

R. R. Bahadur has been working on theoretical and computer simulation studies of how well asymptotic test efficiencies approximate actual efficiencies in samples of finite sizes.

Teaching and Research Guidance

As in earlier years, the Planning and Regional Survey Unit was engaged in teaching for the One-year Evening Course in Statistics. Sixteen students took the final examination of the 1972-73 session in October 1973. A new batch of 40 students was admitted to the 1973-74 session.

Eight students were offered admission to the first-year class of the Two-year Research Course in Economics, and six actually joined. Only one candidate completed successfully the litts semester. There are 4 students in the second-year class and 9 students are writing up their thesis proposals.

Some staff members participated in teaching the probationers of the Indian Statistical Service and Indian Economic Service at the request of the Central Statistical Organization and the Institute of Economic Growth.

The supervision of research by some students enrolled in the M. Phil. degree of the Jawaharlal Nehru University was provided by L. S. Bhat, Regional Survey Unit.

P. Mallela gave a series of lectures on "Measure and Probability" with a view to developing a course leading to Asymptotic Distribution Theory with application to econometrics.

Sixteen seminars were organised during the year by the Unit.

2.3. Statistical Quality Control Division (S.O.C.)

The Government of India set up a Statistical Quality Control (SQC) Division in 1952 under the technical guidance of the Indian Statistical Institute with the object of: (a) promoting the application and development of SQC methods; and (b) undertaking education, training and research in SQC in the country in order to step up the quality of goods and improve productivny in industry.

The Division which started with barely three specialists serviced at the time six factories with a grant of about Rs. 0.50 lakh. It has now grown to 14 SQC units and project centres established all over the country with about 60 specialists servicing 62 factories including some of the

key public sector enterprises like steel, electronics, drugs, high pressure boilors and public utilities like Railways and State Transport organisations. Some schools were established to train specialists and workers, technologists, managers etc, in the short-term and specialised courses in SQC and allied techniques. Over 12,500 managers, technologists etc. have been trained so far. The Division has serviced over 1,000 factories, produced about 300 specialists, brought out over 650 popular write-ups, brochures etc. and published over 200 research papers in the field. The Division now earns about 90 per cent of its direct expenditure, and has a special fund for financing some of the development tests.

The Policy Advisory Committee for SQC was reconstituted during the year. The Committee consists of Shri M. S. Pathak (Member, Planning Commission) Chairman, Shri Hiten Bhaya (Chairman, Hindustan Steel Ltd.), Shri V. Krishnamurthy (Chairman & Managing Director, Bharat Heavy Electricals Ltd.), Dr. C. R. Rao (Director & Secretary, Indian Statistical Institute) and Shri S. M. Sundara Raju (Chief, SQC Division, Indian Statistical Institute).

Service: The successful completion of the Railway Special Project undertaken by the Division for the railways and the conclusion of the one-year Special Training Assignment for officers of the Hindustan Steel are the highlights of work during the period.

The Railways had entrusted the problem of exploring improvements in operational efficiency in the servicing of goods train at the Shalimar-Madras terminals and undertaking wagon utilisation and improvement studies in Bengal-Bihar coal fields. Conducting trials for projecting demand for wagons for increased coal movements during the Fifth Five Year Plan was yet another exercise. The project commenced in January and concluded in September 1973. Preliminary discussions were held on the report with the Chairman and the members of the Railway Board. Follow-up seminars and discussion meetings have been planned.

The One-year Special Course arranged for officers of the Hindustan Steel Ltd. concluded in September 1973. The 28 officers who were trained are now linking up for in-plant project assignments with the specialist teams of the ISI located in the plants of the Hindustan Steel Ltd. An interesting feature was the in-plant project-studies on a number of problems that the participants had pursued as a part of their training. Even during the training phase, some of the studies had shown scope for impressive improvements in yield, reduced waste and increased productivity, in the steel plants.

A Master Plan was prepared for scheduling production of plates in the plate mill in one of the steel plants. Its implementation has resulted in an increased yield of 3 to 4 per cent in the plate mill.

Intensive project-studies were carried out in the Hindustan Photo Films Ltd. and Indian Drugs and Pharmaceuticals Ltd. The studies had shown distinct scope for improvement in yield and reduction in rejections in the products in the plants.

A number of project studies involving quality systems development were pursued in Rourkela, Alloy and Bhilai Steel Plants, high-pressure boiler and electronics plants. Quality systems manuals have since been developed in each plant.

Arrangements are being made to take up regular service and training of personnel in all plants of Bharat Heavy Electricals Ltd.

Arrangements are being made to commence work in the coal washeries in order to improve the quality control and lower costs of coal supplied to the steel plants and the power generating plants.

In response to the invitation from the Ministry of Communications, Government of India, proposals are being worked out to institute quality control and operations research studies in the Post and Telegraph and Telephone Departments. A special project is also being undertaken at the Central Bureau of Revenue and Taxes. Government of India. New Delhi.

The introduction of SQC systems was taken up in 18 new plants. Service was continued to 62 plants. Three hundred and nine technical reports were sent to the plants receiving such service.

Education and Training: 1591 persons were trained in the in-plant, short-term and other courses. As in earlier years, in-plant training received major attention.

One hundred and seven persons were undergoing professional training at the post-graduate level from schools in Madras, Bombay and Calcutta, for specialisation in quality control and 28 persons were attached to the one year HSL course. Fifty-two persons were undergoing training in the six-month evening certificate course at Bangelore.

The development of SQC management courses was one of the exercises during the period. Ten courses were conducted as exploratory trials and 343 executives and managers etc. were covered. The experience has been encouraging.

A significant feature during the year has been a special programme of training designed to the persons for the quality control departments of the sick textile mills managed by the Kerala State Textile Corporation.

Promotion: The staff members participated in 24 seminars and 153 lectures and talks were also given by them.

Moderate promotional efforts were also carried out to extend the frontiers of applications in SQC. Introductory visits were paid to 59 plants and 22 reports on pilot studies and promotional work were sent.

A significant feature of the promotional activities during the year consisted of surveys and studies undertaken in all the plants of the Bharat Heavy Electricals Ltd. in Bhopal, Hyderabad and Hardwar. The proposals for regular service and training have been accepted. Arrangement are being made to take up work in all the plants.

Fiftyone training manuals/technical reports were prepared by SQC Units.

Research: 24 papers were produced during the period for publication in journals and presentation at seminars and conventions.

Other Activities: The Hindustan Steel Ltd. agreed to play the role of a counterpart in organising an all-India Conference, the first of its kind, to discuss the problems and prospects of quality control and development in steel and allied industries. Rourkela has been chosen as the venue. The General Manager of this steel plant is providing the necessary assistance.

Special surveys are being launched in some select industry sectors to assess the current status of quality and initiate measures to popularise modern quality systems.

Visiting Expert: During his stay of about five months as a visiting expert in the Statistical Quality Control Division, Mr. 1. Baba, Head, Baba Consulting Engineers Group, Japan (15 November 1972-15 April 1973) helped in formulating quality systems development in a few selected plants and organised some training sessions at advanced levels of the design of experiments and process optimisations. Mr. Baba offered useful suggestions in a report for exploring avenues to accelerate the growth of SQC in India.

2.4. Library and Information Services

The Central Library at Baranagar had a collection of 1,32,068 books and bound journals, 33,266 reprints, monographs, specialised technical reports, besides a large collection of maps, nuicrofilms, microfiches and photoprints. The services of the branch libraries at Bombay, Bangalore, Baroda, Cochin, Coimbatore, Delhi, Giridih, Madras and Trivandrum were coordinated with those of the Central Library to serve the researchers, students and staff of the lastitute.

Membership: The total membership of the Library increased to 2,685 (2,075 research and other staff members of the Institute, students attached to the Research and Training School, 330 outside student members, 230 sessional members and 50 ordinary members). Two hundred thirty persons were given special permission to use the Library during the period.

Acquisition: During the year, the Library received 2,638 current periodicals—887 through subscription, 1,036 on exchange and 715 as gifts. Fifty-three new periodicals were added to the Library, of which 47 were on subscription, three in exchange and three as gifts. The Library continued its exchange arrangements with 164 foreign and 65 Indian institutions and received periodicals and other serials from them in exchange of Sankhyi, The Indian Journal of Statistics.

Technical Processing: The Library classified 361 and catalogued 401 books. The revision of book classification and of catalogue cards number 112 and 51 respectively. During the period, 2124 cards were filed and 83 books added to the collection. The Central Records processed and indexed 1,438 old files, 1,027 newspapers and 3,782 maps.

Circulation: Seventeen thousand four hundred eighty books and 17,301 journal parts or volumes were issued for reference and 11,275 books on loan. Ninety-two newspapers, 119 maps and 60 old files were issued for reference. There were inter-Library loan transactions with 11 local and outstation libraries during the period.

Reference and Bibliographic Services: The Library compiled and prepared the following on request: (a) Bibliography on Max-Weber, (b) Contributions of Professor P. C. Mahalanobis, (c) Foreign private investments—a ending list, (d) Rural surveys—comparisons and methods: a select list of documents, (e) Documents dealing with truth and statistics, and (f) Indian documentation periodicals in economics.

The short reference questions answered numbered about 819.

Genetal and Scientific Photography: During the period, 937 photographs were taken: 1,594 bronude enlargenents, 645 reproductions, 385 slides and 178 photostat copies were made and 19 x-ray and roll films were processed.

Reprographic Service: During the period, 8,750 pages of scientific treatises and other reading materials were microfilmed and 6,225 pages of photoprints prepared. 675 Xerox copies were prepared. The Library also extended reprographic service to the Indian National Scientific Documentation Centre, New Delhi, and several other scientific institutions.

Circulating Library: The Workers Circulating Library had a collection of 26,138 books and the members numbered 1,870. During the period, the Circulating Library added to its collection 364 books, of which 19 were in English, 264 in Bengali, 37 in Hindi and 44 in Oriya. It issued 43.532 books to its members.

Documentation and Information Services: Bibliographies which are being prepared include to on (i) Artificial Rain Making, and (ii) Scientific Publications of the ISI. Some of the existing bibliographies are being revised.

Translation: Five German and two Russian documents were translated.

Research: During the period, Document-Use-Survey was initiated with the subject group of sociology, demography and family planning as a pilot project to be extended to economics, planning, biological sciences, statistics and mathematics. Another project undertaken was "Use of documents having cross reference entries given in the classified sequence of the catalogue, to the subject group of sociology-family planning-demography, from other disciplines."

The Information Research and Services Wing was formed in the Library on 15 December 1973 to look after translation, documentation and reprography.

2.5. Documentation Research and Training Centre (D.R.T.C.), Bangalore

Training: The nine candidates admitted for training in Documentation and Information Science for 192-72 completed their formal training. They are working on the Trend Report to qualify for the Associateship in Documentation and Information Science.

Nine candidates were admitted to the Documentation Course (1973-74) which commenced on 15 April 1973.

Research: The main subjects of research were: (1) Universe of Subjects, (2) Subject-Fields, (3) Presentation of Ideas, (4) Book Indexing, (5) Social Change and the Library. (6) Role of Information Scientists in Workshops, (7) Planning of Documentation Systems, (8) Intellectual Foundation of an Information Finding System, (9) Classification, (10) Cataloguing, (11) Abstracing, (12) Role of Review Documents in the Diffusion of Knowledge, (13) Product Planning and Information, (14) Computerised Information Finding System, and (15) Obsolescence and Utility Factors of Periodicals.

Seminars: The following seminars were organized by the Documentation Research and Training Centre, Bangalore:

- 1. D.R.T.C. Mid-year Refresher Seminar on Subject Headings, 9-14 August 1973.
- D.R.T.C. Eleventh Annual Seminar, 11-15 February 1974. The "Planning of Library and Documentation Systems" was the theme of the seminar. The discussions centred round twenty papers and the deliberations were consolidated in the form of sixteen propositions.

Publications: The DRTC continued to collaborate with the Sarada Ranganathan Endowment for Library Science in the publication of the quarterly "Library Science with a Stant to Documentation." The DRTC published the following: (I) DRTC Annual Seminar (II), Volume of papers, pp. 406.

Papers Contributed: During the period, the staff of the DRTC contributed 37 papers, some of which were read at conferences.

Consultancy Service: The DRTC provided consultancy service to the Central Food and Technological Research Institute, Mysore and the Madras Institute of Development Studies. Several other institutions sought its advice for improving their library services.

Lectures: Eighteen visiting scientists gave lectures. The DRTC staff gave talks on 18 subjects under the auspices of outside organisations. The Sarada Ranganathan Endowment for Library Science organised the second series of Dr. S. R. Ranganathan Memorial Lectures during 11-15 February 1974. Eighteen colloquia were also organised by the DRTC.

Library: During the period, the Library received 190 books, 7 new periodicals and 43 reports/reprints.

International Collaboration: The D.R.T.C. has been actively participating in the following projects of the United Nations Education, Social and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO):

International Information System on Research in Documentation (ISORID): With a view to promoting and coordinating research in library science, documentation, information science, archives, etc., the ISORID programme was established by the UNESCO to facilitate the international exchange and transfer of research results in these subject fields. The Indian National Commission for Co-operation with the UNESCO designated the D.R.T.C., Bangalore, in 1973 as the National Information Transfer Centre on research projects in library science and documentation. Reports received from libraries and documentation centres in India and those based on research work in the DRTC have been sent to the UNESCO.

UNESCO Survey of Bibliographical Services: At the request of the Indian National Commission for Co-operation with the UNESCO, the DRTC has provided information, lists, and statistics of publications in India, as a contribution to the UNESCO Survey of "Bibliographical Services throughout the World."

UNISIST Handbook for Scientific and Technical Information and Documentation Services:

As a member of the International Advisory Committee for the Handbook, Professor Neclamaghan provided the editors with a number of reports and articles produced by the DRTC and others as material for use in the preparation of the Handbook.

UNESCO Project on the Comparability of Information Science Degrees: As a member of the International Advisory Committee of the project, Professor Neelameghan sent notes and information material on degrees in library science courses in India and on the criteria for equivalence of degrees such as those used by the Inter-University Board of India.

Classification of Documents on Mahatma Gandhi: A project to classify and index 821

documents on Mahatma Gandhi in English, available in Indian libraries, was entrusted to the DRTC by the Social Science Documentation Centre, New Delhi. The project has been completed.

3. INTERNATIONAL STATISTICAL EDUCATION CENTRE (ISEC), CALCUTTA

The International Statistical Education Centre (ISEC) is operated jointly by the International Statistical Institute and the Indian Statistical Institute, under the auspices of the UNESCO and the Government of India. The Centre functioned under a Board of Directors consisting of the following: Chairman: C. R. Rao, Members: P. J. Bjerve, G. Goudswaard, E. Lunenberg (ex-officio member representing the International Statistical Institute), B. D. Pandey (Cabinet Secretary, representing the Government of India), D. B. Lahiri and T. J. Rao, Member-Secretary (representing the Indian Statistical Institute).

Twenty-two trainces from twelve countries in South and South-East Asia, the Far Ess and also from the Commonwealth countries of Africa attended the regular courses. Two traines from Brunei attended a special course in statistics.

The Government of India awarded 14 fellowships for the foreign trainees in the Twentyswenth Term, under the Technical Co-operation Scheme of the Colombo Plan (10), and the Special Commonwealth African Assistance Plan (SCAAP) (4). There were eight other trainees outside the Colombo Plan and SCAAP for the regular course and two for the special course.

The Twentyseventh Term opened on I June 1973. English is the medium of instruction at the Centre. The training imparted included lectures, laboratory work, project training, assisted reading and field work. The first four months at Calcutta were devoted to General Statistical Methods including Auxiliary Mathematics, Computational Techniques, Probability Theory, Numerical Mathematics, Sampling Techniques, Economics, Economic Statistics, Statistical Organisation and Procedures. As in the previous terms, a six-week training in governmental statistics was given at the Central Statistical Organisation, New Delhi, during the period October-November 1973. During the next three months, general lectures were also given on Probability Theory, Vital Statistics and Demography, Sampling Theory, Statistical Distributions, Inference, Advance Statistical Methods, Analysis of Variance and Elements of the Theory of Design of Experiments, Economic Statistics and Economic Planning, During February-March 1974, specialisation courses on an individual basis were given in the following fields: Large Scale Sample Surveys, Economic Planning, Demography, Data Processing and Mathematical Statistics and the Design of Experiments.

In the final examination, all the 22 successful trainees were awarded Certificates of Merit.

Professor Goro Ishii, Department of Mathematics, Osaka City University, Japan, joined the Centre on 10 November 1973 as Visiting Professor and left in April 1974. He delivered a series of lectures on Statistical Inference to the general body of students. He conducted specialisation course on Mathematical Statistics and the Design of Experiments for a selected group of students. Professor Ishii also participated in the research activities of the Indian Statistical Institute and delivered a number of lectures to the staff and students of the Research and Training School.

4. Convocations

4.1. Eighth Convocation: Indian Statistical Institute

The Indian Statistical Institute held its Eighth Convocation for awarding the B. Stat., M. Stat, and Ph.D. degrees on 31 December 1973. Diplomas were also distributed at the function

to a large number of candidates in courses in Applied Statistics, Professional Examinations, Statistical Quality Control, and Electronic Computers, etc. National Professor S. N. Bose, F.R.S., President of the Institute, presided. Shir P. N. Haksar, Chairman of the Institute, welcomed the guests. Dr. Amartya Sen, London School of Economics, delivered the Convocation Address, "Dimensions of Unemployment in India." Professor M. Mukherjee, Director, Research and Training School, presented the annual review on research and training. Dr. C. R. Rao, F.R.S., Director and Secretary of the Institute, made the concluding remarks.

The Seventh Convocation of the Institute had been held on 24 January 1970. Successful candidates for four years (1970, 1971, 1972 and 1973) were awarded the diplomas and certificates at the Eighth Convocation. In all, 14 candidates were awarded the Ph.D. degree, 108 the M. Stat. degree by examination, one the M. Stat. degree by thesis and 61 the B. Stat. degree. Fourteen candidates were awarded the diploma in Computer Science, two in Demography, two in Econometrics and Planning, and 173 in Statistical Quality Control.

In the professional examinations, 25 candidates were awarded the Statistician's Diploma, three the Statistician's Field Survey Diploma, 32 the Computer certificate, and four the Statistical Field Survey (Junior) certificate. Eight candidates were awarded the Associateship in Documentation, Bangalore.

In the evening courses, the total numbers of candidates awarded certificates, etc. are shown in brackets:

(i) Statistical Methods and Applications (154), (ii) Elementary Techniques of Computation (31), (iii) Statistical Computation (23), and (iv) Certificate Course in S.Q.C. and Operations Research (116). Sixtyfive candidates successfully completed the Intensive Course on Programming and Applications of Electronic Computers and 11 candidates the Operation of Punched Card Machines.

4.2. Convocation of the International Statistical Education Centre, Calcutta

The International Statistical Education Centre (ISEC) Calcutta, operated jointly by the International Statistical Institute and the Indian Statistical Institute, under the auspices of the UNESCO the Government of India held its annual convocation on 28 March 1974. Certificates of Merit were awarded to 24 trainees from 13 countries who successfully completed the twenty-seventh term of the ISEC (June 1973-March 1974).

Shri Siddhartha Sankar Ray, Chief Minister, West Bengal, presided. Professor M. Mukherjee, Director, Research and Training School, welcomed the guests. Concluding remarks were made by Dr. Ca. Rao, F.R.S., Chairman, Board of Directors, International Statistical Education Centre

5. PROFESSIONAL EXAMINATIONS

All the four open professional examinations were held during 1973: (f) Statistician's Diploma, (ii) Computer's Certificate, (iii) Statistical Field Survey, and (iv) Punched Card Machine. The Statistician's Diploma and the Computer's Certificate examinations were held as usual twice in May and November. Due to poor response from candidates, the Punched Card Machine examinations were not held separately in May, but were held simultaneously with the Statistical Field Survey examination only once in November 1973.

Eight centres all over India were pressed into service for the professional examinations in 1973. Six of these centres—Bangalore, Bombay, Calcutta, Delhi, Lucknow and Madras—had always some candidates to offer and the centres were all utilised for the examinations in May and November 1973. Giridih was, however, utilised only for the examination in May 1973. The largest number of candidates appeared for the Statistician's Diploma examination and most of them appeared from Calcutta and Delhi. Candidates for the Computer's Certificate examination were practically all confined to the Calcutta Centre.

The details of candidates who registered and appeared for the professional examinations during 1973 are given below:

Statistician's Diploma Examination: During 1973, 146 candidates registered (73 in May; 73 in November) for the examinations but 21 candidates (11 in May; 10 in November) failed to appear in any of these papers. Of those who finally appeared, 69 candidates (37 in May; 32 in November) passed in one or more papers.

Computer's Certificate Examination: In 1973, 42 candidates registered (24 in May; 18 in November) for the examination. Only 4 candidates (3 in May; 1 in November) failed to appear in any of the papers. Of those who finally appeared, 23 candidates (13 in May; 10 in November) qualified in one or more papers.

Statistical Field Survey Examination: The Statistical Field Survey examinations are held only once in November every year. In November 1973, there were no candidates for the S.F.S. Diploma examination. Two candidates registered in November 1973 for the Field Survey Cerificate examinations—one for a theoretical paper only in the Junior Certificate and the other in the practical paper of the Senior Certificate examination. Both candidates appeared and passed.

Punched Card Machine Examination: The examinations are usually held only once in May every year. In May 1973, however, because of the poor response, no separate examinations were held for any of the papers.

In November 1973, only one candidate registered for two papers of the Punched Card Data Processing Diploma examination. He appeared and passed in both the papers. There was no candidate for the Punched Card Machine Operators' Certificate examinations.

2. Number of successful candidates qualifying for the award of Diplomas and Certificates in Open Professional Examinations: The number of candidates who had successfully completed the entire professional examinations and qualified for the award of Diplomas and Certificates during 1973 is given below:

Statistician's Diploma: Nine candidates (2 in May; 7 in November) qualified.

Computer's Certificate: Twelve candidates (9 in May; 3 in November) qualified.

Statistical Field Survey Examinations: (i) Junior Certificate, (ii) Senior Certificate, and (iii) Diploma examination: only one candidate qualified in November 1973 for the senior certificate examination and pone qualified for the award in the other two examinations.

Machine Examinations: (i) Punched Card Machine Operator's Certificate, (ii) Punched Card Data Processing Diploma—no candidate qualified.

6. VISITING SCIENTISTS

A number of distinguished foreign scientists participated in the research, training and other scientific activities of the Institute during the year. Some of them came on invitation and spent fairly long periods at the Institute to assist in regular work, while others came for short periods and gave lectures and seminars. Most of them were available for consultations by research workers and teachers of the Institute.

 The following scientists visited the Institute on invitation and worked for fairly long periods during the year 1973-74. The duration of the visit is mentioned within brackets against each name.

PROFESSOR RUDOLF ALTEVOCT, Head, Department of Physiology and Ecology, University of Muster, Federal Republic of Germany (26 December 1973—24 February 1974) collaborated with the research activities of the Crop Science Unit. He accompanied Professor T. A. Davis to the Andaman Islands to continue the investigations on the coconut robber crab (Birgas Latro). A large number of female robber crabs which eluded them during the previous trip were spotted. Their behaviour was studied and activities recorded on movie films. Preserved specimens were also brought to Calcutta for further studies.

Ma. Ikuo Baba, Visiting Expert in Quality Systems from Japan (15 November 1972—14 April 1973) helped the Statistical Quality Control Division in formulating quality systems development in a few selected plants in different parts of the country and also organised training sessions at advanced levels on the design of experiments and process optimisations. He offered useful suggestions in a report for exploring avenues to accelerate the growth of SOC in India.

DR. R. P. GUPTA, Ohio State University, U.S.A. (arrived 15 December 1973) has been working in the Planning and Regional Survey Unit, New Delhi. He carried out research on Combinatorical Mathematics and Theory of Graphs and also participated in the teaching of the two-vear research course in economics.

PROFESSOR GORO ISHII, Department of Mathematics, Osaka City University, Japan (10 November 1973—April 1974) came as the visiting professor for the Twenty-seventh Term, International Statistical Education Centre, Calcutta. He gave a series of lectures on Statistical Inference and conducted a specialisation course on Mathematical Statistics and the Design of Experiments. He also participated in the research activities of the Institute. Lectures: (f) Relationship algebra: commutative case and non-commutative case, (iii) Association algebra and its parametric meeting, (iii) Relationship algebra of PBIBD, and (iv) An example showing the existence of the best statistical procedures when the minimal sufficient statistic is incomplete.

Professor Dionoire Kostric, Director, Institute for Experimental Phonetics and Speech Pathology, Belgrade, Yugoslavia (13 December 1973-13 March 1974) came on his sixth visit to the Institute in connexion with the programme of fundamental linguistic research being carried out in collaboration between the Indian Statistical Institute and the Institute for Experimental Phonetics and Speech Pathology, Yugoslavia. His visit was arranged during the year under the Fourth Indo-Yugoslav Cultural Exchange Programme.

During his visits to Agartala (Tripura), Calcutta, New Delhi, and Hyderabad, Professor Kostic met eminent linguists, educationists, doctors and government officials, in connexion with his work. In collaboration with Indian scientists, he wrote the following books: (f) A Shot Outline

of Hindi Phonetics, 1974 (in press), (ii) Tests for Articulatory Evaluation of Bongali Speech Sounds, 1974, (iii) Tests for Articulatory Evaluation of Telugu Speech Sounds, 1974, and (iv) Articulatory Evaluation of Speech Sounds—Method and Application, 1974.

Professor Kostic participated in the following: (f) Seminar on problems of hard-of-hearing children and evaluation of speech. Agartala, Tripura, 2-10 January 1974; (ii) Seminar on linguistics and linguistic methods, Calcutta, 11-17 January 1974; (iii) Seminar on Telugu phonetics, Hyderabad, 20-21 February 1974, and (iv) Seminar on speech rehabilitation of hearing-impaired children, Hyderabad, 22 February 1974.

Professor Kostic advised the following organisations on different problems:

- (i) Department of Linguistics, Osmania University, Hyderabad, regarding the installation of laboratory equipment to be used for research in speech pathology.
- (ii) School for Deaf Children run by the Social Welfare Board, Andhra Pradesh, regarding the preliminary collection of data on children in the school, and the testing of hearing ability and speech.

Lectures: (i) Language and science today (Calcutta); (ii) Application of phonetics to the speech habilitation of hearing-impaired children, with special emphasis on Indian languages (Delhi); (iii) The hearing-impaired child—classification according to age and onset of hearing loss; phonetic audiometry and selective amplification—a multi-disciplinary approach to speech habilitation of the hearing-impaired child (Delhi); and (iv) Treatment of speech pathological cases, with special emphasis on hearing-impaired children (Hyderabad).

DR. PAMELA L. ROBINSON, Department of Zoology, University College London (7 March 1974—April 1974) came in connexion with the integrated programme of research in the Geological Studies Unit. She also had discussions with the scientific workers on their current research work and future programmes.

PROFESSOR AMARTYA SEN, London School of Economics, U.K., delivered the Eighth Convocation Address, "Dimensions of Unemployment in India," at the Indian Statistical Institute on 31 December 1973. Lectures: (i) The concept and measurement of poverty; (ii) The so-called fundamental theorem of capital theory (Delhi and Calcuta).

- DR. J. N. SRIVASTAVA, Colorado State University, U.S.A. (arrived 1 Jonuary 1974) has been conducting research on incomplete multivariate models at the Planning and Regional Survey Unit, New Delhi. Series of lectures: Incomplete multivariate models.

11. SOCIETY TYPE ACTIVITIES: BRANCHES

11.1 Mysore State Branch: Executive Committee

The office-bearers and members of the Executive Committee for the year 1973-74 were elected in August 1973.

Membership: There were 51 members at the end of the year (Life members: 10; Institutional members; 5; and ordinary members; 36).

Examination: The following examinations of the Indian Statistical Institute were held at the Bangalore Centre:

The selection tests for admission to the B. Stat., M. Stat. and advanced studies and also the research courses in economics. 22 July 1973.

The professional examinations in statistics—Statistician's Diploma, etc. May and November 1973.

Survey and Seminars

Survey of Electronics Industries in the Bangalore Metropolitan Area: The survey, conducted at the visitation of the Karnataka State Financial Corporation, involved the current status of production of electronics goods in the Bangalore area in the small-scale sector, its growth prospects and financial implication.

Survey on Printing Industry in Bangalore City: A survey of the printing industry in Bangalote City conducted by the Market Research and Information Service Wing of the Branch covered the existing facilities in Bangalore for printing of different items like balance sheets, diaries, books, etc. apart for general work and the potential demand.

Survey of Living and Working Conditions of Students of Bangalore University: This survey involving 40,000 students (Bangalore University) has been completed and the report is being prepared.

Sembar on Electronics Industry in Bangalore: Over 200 delegates representing producers, consumers, bankers, government departments, scientists and technologists attended the Seminar on Electronics Industry held on 20 October 1973 under the joint auspices of the Mysore State Financial Corporation, Small Industries Service Institute and the Mysore State Branch. The Seminar was based on the report on the electronics industry (small-scale sector) prepared by the Branch. Professor M. G. K. Menon, Chairman, Electronics Commission, gave the key-note address and Shri S. M. Krishoa, Minister for Industries, Mysore State, inaugurated the Seminar.

The Seminar recommended assistance in the supply of raw material, documentation, reduction of varieties and the constitution of a technical cell by financial institutions. It also advocated a quicker disposal of loan applications, the liberalisation of working capital advance and training in SOC, specially for electronics industries in the small-scale sector.

11.2 Bombay Branch

Membership: The membership of the Bombay-Poona area was as follows: Life members, 18; Ordinary members, 15; Total 33.

New Course: A new course on "Decision-making Techniques for Administration" for Government officers in Maharashtra State was started on 29 April 1974. Thirty Under Scretaries, Deputy Secretaries and Deputy Directors are attending the course.

Admission Tests: The Bombay Branch conducted eight admission tests on behalf of the Psychonetry Research and Service Unit, Research and Training School, Indian Statistical Institute. Among the organisations for which admission tests were held may be mentioned the Indian Institute of Management, Calcutta, Hindusthan Aircrafts Ltd., Bangalore, and the Fool Corporation of India, Sindri.

12. EIGHTIETH BIRTH ANNIVERSARY OF PROFESSOR P. C. MAHALANOBIS

The eightieth birth anniversary of the late Professor P. C. Mahalanobis was celebrated at the Indian Statistical Institute, Baranagar, on 29 June 1973.

National Professor Satyendranath Bose, F.R.S., who presided at a meeting held on the occasion, recalled the significant contribution to statistics and national planning made by Profesor P. C. Mahalanobis. He was no ivory tower intellectual; in his life there was a harmonious blending of theory and practice. Recalling the humble beginning of the Indian Stetistical Institute in the early nineteen thirties, Professor Bose said that few could imagine then that such a unique multi-disciplinary Institute could be built in less than three decades where students and reservate scientists from all over the world would come to study and work. Man is not immortal but is achievement is and the Institute, which he had built almost singlehanded against heavy odds, us an inheritance to be nurtured by the present generation of Indian scientists. The Indian Statistical Institute, Professor Bose concluded, would over bear eloquent testimony to this great Indian.

Dr. Roma Chaudhuri, Vice-Chancellor, Rabindra Bharati University, paid glowing tributs to the memory of Professor P. C. Mahalanobis.

Recordings of some of Professor Mahalanobis's speeches on the role of statistics and he recitations of Tagore's poems were played on the occasion.

An exhibition, depicting Professor Mahalanobis's life and work, was organized at "Amppali", the residence of the late Professor. The items in the exhibition included his scientific and

literary publications, manuscripts, and letters from ominent persons like Rabindranath, Albert Einstein, Jawaharlal Nehru, C. V. Raman, Jamini Roy, Brojen Seal, Bertrand Russel, Neils Bohr, Sigmund Freud and Ronald A. Fisher. The exhibition reflected Mahalanobis's fruitful endeavour in the field of science and culture for more than five decades.

Exhibitions on the research activities of the Institute were also organised on the occasion in the different research units (in statistics and natural and social sciences) of the Institute. A symposium on Professor Mahalanobis's contribution to science and culture was held under the Chairmanship of Dr. R. K. Mukherjee.

PART III

Statement of Accounts and Auditors' Report for the Year 1973-74

AUDITORS' REPORT

We report that we have audited the Balance Sheet as at 31st March, 1974, of

- (a) The Indian Statistical Institute
- (b) "Other Funds"

signed by us under reference to this report and the Income & Expenditure Accounts for the year ended on that date with the books and records maintained by the Institute and produced to us and information and explanations given and subject to and read with the notes thereon and also subject to the remarks given below have found them to be in accordance therewith.

The remarks referred to above are:

1. Separation of National Sample Survey Unit from the Indian Statistical Institute

As from Notification in the Government of India Gazette, it was observed that National Sample Survey Unit was to be separated from the Indian Statistical Institute and would form a part of the Directorate of National Survey which is a Government organisation.

The separation took place with effect from 1st June, 1972.

The consequential changes in connection with this separation with regard to assets (both fixed and current) and liabilities have not yet been worked out and reflected in the accounts of the year under audit. As such, both the Income & Expenditure Account for the year ended 31st March, 1974 and the Balance Sheet as at that date will not give a true and fair view to the extent to this unworked out nosition.

BALANCE SHEET

1. Fixed Assets

- (a) Asset Registers were not maintained for Land Development, Buildings. Overbridges, Sheds and Structures, H. T. Electricity and HTEI for UNTAA. Register for land though maintained did not give in many cases the value of land and in many cases where values were recorded in the Register, the same did not agree with the values as per financial books of accounts. Register for other Fixed Assets, though maintained, leave much scope for improvement as such;
 - (i) Assets as per financial accounts could not be compared with those of the Asset Registers as the cumulative totals of different types of assets were not shown in the Asset Registers.
 - (ii) Location of assets were not disclosed.
 - (iii) Description of Assets, e.g., Model, Identity, Numbers, etc., were also not shown,

- (b) Values of Fixed Assets acquired on dates prior to 31st March, 1952 were taken from those appearing in the inventories prepared as on that date.
- (c) Certificates from the officer concerned regarding the existence and condition of the movable assets as at 31st March, 1974 belonging to the Institute and to different Funds under it were not produced before us for the purpose of verification at the time of audit. However, it is understood that the Institute is having a quantitative list of Furnitures and Equipments in possession of NSSO. Administrative Officer and Assistant Secretary of the Institute by his office memounder C4136 dated 18th January, 1973 requested all departmental heads to prepare list of assets in their respective departments. However, whether the order was carried out or not could not be verified by us as no verification statement of assets of respective departments were made available to us at the time of our audit.

Moneover, maintenance of records of fixed assets at any particular unit offered little scope of monaring a physical verification list with local records. The values shown in the Balance Sheet are as per General Ledger of the Institute.

In this connection, we would also refer to the suggestion of the Committee on Auditors' Report for 1971-72 Accounts regarding the removal of deficiencies in the maintenance of Asset Registers. Though the suggestion of the Committee were adopted by the Council, the same does not appear to have been carried out since then. The matter should be looked into immediately and all necessary steps should be taken by the Institute.

(d) Land: In respect of the following lands, Possession Certificate for Items I-IX and Grant Certificate for Item 'X' were produced before us for the purpose of verification.

No Deed of Purchase or Deed of Lease duly stamped and registered was produced before us. As suggested by the previous auditors, legal opinion was sought by the Institute as to whether the Possession/Grant Certificates can give the Institute "Good & Marketable Title" to the properties concerned.

According to the legal opinion it appears that the Institute did not become absolute owner of the land unless the Government conveyed the land to the Institute by a Deed and at present, therefore, the Institute has no good and marketable title to the properties. Tr.:

The above amount has been shown as Preliminary expenses for construction of Building but the same should have been shown under Suspense account as suggested by the previous auditor, Since there has been no change in the facts and circumstances from the previous year, we also hold that the amount should have been transferred to Suspense account.

- (f) Sheds and Structures: (i) The written down values of sheds and structures: Rs. 67,577,54 P on 203, Barrackpore Trunk Road and 153, Gopal Lal Tagore Road do not give a true and fur view as at 31st March, 1974 as the values of the sheds and structures demolished zero not, excertain ting to the management, ascertainable. Steps, if any, taken by the management to ascertain the value of the demolished structures were not, however, explained to us this year also.
- (ii) The Sheds and Structures situated at 5, R. N. Tagore Road (written down value as on 31.3.74, Rs. 2.01,791.18 P) have been constructed for UNTAA Workshop on the land possessed under Rent Requisition Order.
- (g) It is understood that in connection with the construction of the Electronic Computer, certain items of Furniture and Equipment were loaned to ISIJU in earlier years. It is also understood that a certified list for the same exists with the Institute wherein the valuation of two items do not bear any amount and reported as "not known."
- (h) Soviet Printing Machine: Soviet Printing Machine (Item 'L' of Schedule I of the Institute) was received by the Institute as gift from Soviet Academy of Sciences and taken into the Book of Accounts at a value of Rs. 18,66,696.58 P by corresponding credit to the General Fund in 1970-71. The Machine is being used by the Statistical Publishing Society under an agreement dated 9th December, 1970 between the Institute and the Statistical Publishing Society. We understand from the report of the Committee on Auditors' report for 1971-72 Accounts that the Machinery are in existence and that a few items are damaged and that there were some special difficulties in utilizing some items at the oresent moment.
- (i) Construction at Baranagore, Library Building (Item B 1-6 in Schedule I): Rs. 76,889being the cost of Iron & Steel purchased during the year is still lying in stock. The above amount has been shown as addition to library building (vide Schedule I) during the year. But no construction of Library Building appears to have taken place during the year.

In our opinion the amount should have been shown in store of Iron and Steel and not as an addition to fixed assets.

2. Rental of Telephone under OYT Scheme (Item 2 of the Institute's Balance Sheet, Assets side)

The last year balance of the above account was Rs. 66,631.67 P. During the year, the said

amount has been charged off to revenue according to the direction of the Government of India, Ministry of Planning, Department of Statistics, in their letter No. G25014/1/71-NSS-1 dated 13.11.72.

3. Investment:

The Scripts in respect of investment of the different funds under the Institute are standing in the name of Institute.

 Advance on account of ISIJU Expenditure on Joint Project for the contruction of Electronic Computers in progress (excluding value of Furniture, Equipment, etc., loaned to ISIJU which are included in Schedule 1) Rs. 7,62,329.27 P (Item 3 on Assets side of the Institute's Balance Sheet).

The above amount has been brought forward from last year. No development has taken place in spite of daborate observation made by the previous auditor on the above Joint Project. A confirmation letter dated 28.2.75 was produced to us from Sri S. K. Mitra, Secretary, ISJIU Joint Computer Project Committee wherein Shri Mitra confirmed that "position remains the same as on 31.3.74."

In our opinion the Institute should take immediate action in this matter considering the amount involved in the project.

5. Recoverable Capital Outloy:

In spite of observations made by the previous auditors with regard to second paragraph on the above subject, no adjustment appears to have been made in the accounts.

In course of our verification on the above, it was observed that an extract from the proceedings of the meeting of the Committee of Administration held on the 11th November, 1974 signed by Shri A. Mahalanobis shows that the said committee has decided to adjust Rs. 8,615.29 P (net) as follows:—

In the absence of relevant sanction or acceptance from the Government in respect of claims, we are not in a position to form any opinion as to the extent to which claims made by the Institute will be accepted by the Government in future.

 Amount recoverable from the Government of Mysore in respect of Bangalore Land requisitioned back by the Government of Mysore: Rs. 29,325f- (Item 6 of the assets side of the Institute's Balance Sheet).

The position of the said account remains as before as it was in the last year. There is a difference of Rs. 62/- arising out of the confirmation given by the Deputy Commissioner, Bangalore District, and balance standing in the Institute's book which is still unadjusted. The Institute in its letter (vide letter No. C3879/BL dated 22.3.74) has reminded the Deputy Commissioner of Bangalore District to arrange for immediate repayment of the said balance. But still, to date of our report, the refund has not been received as reported.

In our opinion action should be taken in this regard.

 Grant receivable from the Government of India on account of Plan Expenditure (Item 7.1 of the assets side of the Institute's Balance Sheet).

Total amount has been sanctioned of Rs. 19/- lakhs [vide sanction No. C/18018/1/14-NSS/I(ii)] during the year dated 17th June, 1974 and the amount received against the said grant of Rs. 16/- lakhs, balance of Rs. 3/- lakhs has been shown as "Plan Revenue Receivable", authensicity of which could not be verified by us in the absence of payments made by the Government specifically ear-marked.

- Stores (At cost): (Item 8 on the assets side of the Institute's Balance Sheet and Item 4.1 on the
 assets side of the Balance Sheet of Development Fund II.)
- a) Classification of stores has been made broadly into two categories for the purpose of physical verification.
 - i) Iron & Steel materials, cement and bricks,
 - ii) Other building materials.

No physical verification was done as regards the first category is concerned during the year under audit. Hence, under the circumstances, it will be appreciated that the position on 31.3.74 could not be verified by us.

The physical verification of the second category was made after the close of the year, the result of which showed a net loss (shortage) of Rs. 11,680.81 P during the year which has been shown in the Balance Sheet under the head "Effect of physical verification of building materials" (Item 11 of the assets side of the Institute's Balance Sheet) and has not been written off in the lacome & Expenditure Account.

It appears that in some cases conditions of stores have been deteriorated and some are unusable but no effect has been given for any loss of value due to deterioration of stores and/or obsolescence, if any.

Though stores have been shown in the Institute's Balance Sheet as well as in the Balance Sheet of the Development Fund II but no separate register for stores has been maintained. At reported by the previous auditor, segregation of the stores between these two funds made by the Institute's officials on the basis which could not be satisfactorily explained to us.

b) Iron & Steel for Rs. 76,880/-

The above has been purchased during the year and lying in the campus of the Institute up to the date of our report and has been shown in the building account.

The above purchase has not been entered in the stores ledger like other purchases of materials which in our opinion should have been passed through the stores ledger.

- 10. Loans & Advances: (Item 9 of the assets side of the Institute's Balance sheet)
- 2. Festival advance to workers Rs. 6,656.75 P: No detailed list of the said account has been produced to us for which we could not verify the said account.
 - 3. Advance to Suppliers and Contractors-Rs. 1,14,395.55 P.
 - 4. Suspense & Other Advances-Rs. 4.89,962/-
 - 5. Educational Relief & Other Loans-Rs. 2,69,202.42 P.
 - 6. Security Deposit-Rs. 23,897.07 P.
 - 7. Sundry Debtors (partly recoverable)-Rs. 60,605.30 P.

With regard to item .3, no personal ledger has been maintained and in the absence of which we could not verify all of the above balances for how long they are outstanding.

With regard to item .4, our observations are as follows:-

- There is practically no control over suspense accounts as the account has not been reconciled from time to time with the main ledger.
- The opening balances of the said account could not be verified in absence of audited detailed list.
- 3. There are various accounts including those of visiting professors from abroad which are lying unadjusted for several years. We give below some examples:—

No action appears to have been taken during the year under review for adjusting the above balances. Investigation should be made in this regard.

- It is also observed that some of the balances are still appearing unadjusted in the name of some persons who have already expired.
- 5. Some of the advances given to suppliers against the supply of goods remain unadjusted for a long time. We give below some examples:—

With regard to item .5, we could not verify the said account in the absence of detailed list along with the confirmation from the parties concerned.

While observing item .6, no Security Deposit receipts were made available for our verification. In this connection it has been reported that the rented house at 98, Esplanade East has already been vacated by the Institute but Security Deposit lying with the landlords of Rs. 5,931.36p. has neither been realised nor any follow-up action has been taken.

With regard to item 17, we could not verify the said account in the absence of confirmation letters from the parties concerned and personal ledger of said account. In this connection, we would like to note that a major part of the said is owed by Gun & Shell Factory for a pretty long time. But no action appears to have been taken during the year under audit to recover the dust from the said factory. Moreover, quite a large number of balances comprising very small amounts have been lying unadjusted for a long time.

11. Advance for Land (Schedule 13)-Rs. 91,606.25 p.

a) Regarding 106 B T Road-Rs. 29,799.38 p.

This advance is reported to have been paid on 22.1.58. In spite of observations made by the previous auditor on the above advance for land, no refund has been received by the Institute during the period under audit. However, the Institute has sent a solitary reminder to the Collector Land Acquisition on 23.3.74 (vide Assistant Secretary's letter No. 3857 dated 23.3.74). In our opinion, considering the amount lying for a long time, the Institute should take more vigorous steps to get the refund as early as possible.

b) Re: Bustee Land adjacent to 123, Gopal Lal Tagore Road-Rs. 12,137/-

The position remains as it was in the last year. In spite of comments made by the previous auditors on the above, no follow up action has been taken except one reminder has been sent by the Executive Officer in his letter No. C/6317 dated 20.3.73.

c) Land adjacent to Goopta Nivas-Rs. 5,652/-.

This advance has been lying with the Collector of Land Acquisition Department (N), Aipore, as early as August, 1960. It appears from the correspondences that no follow-up action either by personal approach or through letters, has been taken by the Institute since August,

1970, except one reminder sent on 23.3.74 (vide letter No. C3856). We are unable to understand why the Institute takes such a long time in corresponding with the authority. In our opinion, periodical review should be followed up.

d) Re: 168, Gopal Lal Tagore Road-Rs. 3,744.03 p.

This advance relates to May, 1961. Only a reminder during the period under review has been sent on 23.3.74 (vide Assistant Secretary's letter No. C3855 dated 23.3.74).

e) Re: Land at Madras-Rs. 21.562.50 p.

The position remains as before. The Director of Technical Education (Construction Unit, Madras) in his letter No. CW/AD3/802/T dated 26.4.73 intimated that Rs. 50,000/. is to be deposited towards the development cost of the land. We are given to understand that the Institute has claimed to the Government of India for the said additional amount of Rs. 50,000/- for acquisition of the said land. Hence, provision for liability on account of development cost of Rs. 50,000/- for the said land has not been provided for in the accounts.

12. Effect of Physical Verification of Building Materials: Rs. 11,680.81 p.

The above does not actually represent any asset though displayed on the assets side of the Balance Sheet. In this connection, we refer to our report under 'Store'.

13. Cash and Bank Balances (Item 12 of the Assets side of the Institute's Balance Sheet)

Certificates from banks confirming the balances as on 31.3.1974 were not made available to us for verification for the following banks:—

- i) Nath Bank Ltd. (in liquidation)
- ii) State Bank of India (Delhi A)
- iii) State Bank of India (Delhi B)

GENERAL OBSERVATIONS

It appears from the Schedules VI and VII that the amount shown as Cash balance both in hard and at banks represents the balancing figure, i.e., individual bank account cannot be linked up with individual fund account.

While checking the current account with United Bank of India (C/A No. 324—Durgapur) and the Current Account with the Bank of Baroda, Vilai, with the relevant banker's statement it was found that the said two current accounts have been in operation in the names of Sri R. G. Narasungham and Sri K. K. Banerice respectively instead of the Institute's own name.

In spite of the observations made by the previous auditor on the above defects no steps appeared to have been taken, i.e., transfer of bank accounts from individual name to Institute's own name during the year.

14. General Fund (Item 1 of the Liabilities side of the Institute's Balance Sheet)

Out of the amount of Rs. 1,87,362.28 p. charged in the Income & Expenditure Account as

Expenditure on Books & Journals (Item 12.1 of the Expenditure side of the Income & Expenditure Account of the Institute) and Rs. 1,78,750.75 p. has been capitalised (vide Item H of Schedule f of the Institute) by crediting the General Fund.

- Deposits Other Liabilities: Rs. 1,05,804.23 p. (Item 5.1 of the Institute's Balance Sheet: Liabilities side)
- a) In spite of observations made by the previous auditor for incorporating the accounts of the Hospitality Committee in the accounts of the Institute, acither the defects have been recitied nor the credit balance adjusted by suitable adjustment during the year under review. In our opinion steps should be taken in this regard.
- b) Staff Income-tax and Annuity Deposit: Rs. 27,179.83 ρ. (Item 5.2 of the Liabilities side of the Institute's Balance Sheet)

The above balance represents the deduction of tax at source from the employees of the Institute which has not been deposited with the appropriate authority in time.

c) Library and Other Deposits: Rs. 1,07,712.50 p. (Item 5.3 of the Liabilities side of the Institute's Balance Sheet)

The above balance represents deposits made for library and others by the members and the students lying with the Institute as on the date of the Balance Sheet. In course of our checking the lastitute Library it was observed as follows:—

- i) No system of periodical verification of books.
- ii) There is no record of loss of books/withdrawals.
- There is lack of proper co-ordination between library section and the accounts department in case of refund of deposits.
- d) Staff Insurance, Co-operative Society & S.W. Housing Scheme, etc.—Rs. 35,234.76 p (Item 5.4 of the Liabilities side of the Institute's Balance Sheet)

In the absence of detailed information in relation to the above account, we could not verify the extent of liabilities of the Institute as on the date of the Balance Sheet. The said amount stands as per General Ledger balance.

c) Other Liabilities—Rs. 27,17,029.01 p. (Item 5.6 of the Liabilities side of the Institute's Balance Sheet)

The above liabilities stand for goods and services provided to the Institute as on 31,3. 1974. The liabilities also include the payments made up to June 1974 for goods and services rendered prior to 31,3.1974.

As regards the liability on account of employees' gratuity, it is reported that the Government of India will henceforth reimburge the actual payment of gratuity to employees. Hence, the provision for gratuity payment has not been provided in the Institute's accounts. However, the Institute could not clarify us as to what hancens to the gratuity fund already created.

While capitalising books and journals the Institute has followed the previous convention which is 95% of the total expenditure incurred in purchasing books, journals, newspapers, bulletins, etc. This convention is not clear to us.

16. Excess of Expenditure over receipts of miscellaneous projects and activities on behalf of the Government of India and other bodies pending adjustments on settlement claims made/to be made (Item 5 of the Assets side of the Institute's Balance Sheet).

The above amount includes Rs. 3,88,127.93 p from Ministry of Planning, Government of India for National Sample Survey Organisation (last year's balance Rs. 2,13,200.85 p). Confirmation certificates from NSSO were not made available to us confirming the above balance. Hence, we could not check the allocation of expenses incurred on behalf of them in respect of rent, electricity charges, telephone charges, salary, etc.

17. Observations on Different Funds

Supervision Fee Fund:

- (1) No transaction appears to have been taken place during the year.
- (2) Confirmation certificate regarding credit balance standing in the name of ISI Small Scale Industries Experimental Unit of Rs. 14,610,20 p was not made available to us for verification.

Electronic Data Processing & Computation Unit:

Sundry Debtors: Rs. 20,745.50 p.

The above balance has been outstanding for a pretty long time. The year-wise break up of debts are as follows:

No steps appear to have been taken by the Institute to recover the above debts. In our opinion, immediate steps should be taken in this regard.

INCOME & EXPENDITURE ACCOUNT

(i) Travelling Expenses

Usually advances are given for travelling and debited to Suspense account. While checking other suspense account, it was observed that several advances were given for travelling expenses which remained unadjusted. Therefore, unless such advances are adjusted within the year the travelling expenses as shown in the Income & Expenditure Account would not reflect a true and fair view of the said expenditure. Moreover the defects pointed out by the previous auditor has not been compiled with during the year.

(ii) Reimbursement of Medical Expenses

It was observed, as in last year, that actual bill against which medical advances have been and to employees are not submitted promptly for necessary adjustments. As such medical advances remain unadjusted for a long period, contrary to the rules for reimbursement of medical advances.

It was also observed that the date of payments etc. of the medical bills are not recorded at the Register maintained by the Medical Expenses Reimbursement Unit, though the Register contains specific columns for such purposes. As a result, we could not verify, whether all bills submitted to MERU up to 31st March, 1974 and not paid by that date have been fully provided for or not.

It is noted in this connection that the Committee on auditor's report for 1971-72. Account suggested for maintenance of a Register showing serial number of claim, amount of claim, amount sanctioned and date of payment. But it appears that the suggestion has not so far beat implemented.

In course of our routine checking it was also observed that, the entries in the Personal ledger maintained by the MERU are made only on payment of the bills. There is no system of recording the unpaid bills in the personal ledger. Suggestion may be made in this regard that as some as a claim is received that the same should also be recorded in the personal ledger maintained by MERU so that a list of outstanding claims can be drawn up from the personal ledger.

BANK CHARGES AND INTEREST: Rs. 15.416.76

- (iii) The above includes Rs. 5,000.00 provided to ISI General Provident Fund for utilisation of fund money by the Institute during the year. The detailed information viz. how much money utilised by the Institute, period of utilisation, rate of interest, etc. were not made clear to us in the absence of which we are of opinion that the said interest of Rs. 5,000.00 is provided on an estimated basis and a "token" one. The matter should be looked into.
- (iv) In consistence with past practice Stocks of Stationeries and Consumable Stores, Laboratory Stores, Tools and Minor Accessories, cost of Card Cabinets, etc. are neither taken at the close of the year nor accounted for, though their values are quite substantial. As such the purchases of these items made during the year are charged in full to the Income and Expenditure Account. As suggested in our last report, the Institute should look into the matter and if necessary, should review whether this old practice should be continued or not.

(v) Re: Statistical Publishing Society:

In course of our Audit, it has been observed that Expenditure on various heads viz. Electricity, Telephone etc. was incurred by the Institute on behalf of Statistical Publishing Society. Finally certain portion of the expenditure incurred has been debited to Statistical Publishing Society as the Expenditure incurred on behalf of them. In the absence of detailed information regarding the basis of allocation, we could not check the reasonableness of the expenditure and therefore, are not in a position to give our opinion on the same.

- (vi) "Special Payment" to 48 hours scaled workers of Baranagore Office during the financial year 1973-74. Vide Office Order C 493/PU dated 18th May 1973
- Under Secretary to the Government of India, Ministry of Planning, Department of Statitics, vide Sanction No. C-13012/I/74-NSS 1(i) dated 11/17 June, 1972, has sanctioned Rs. 111.87

lakhs only against Rs. 112.35 lakhs recommended by the Committee, thereby reducing Rs. 0.48 lakhs being the estimated expenditure on payment of Special Pay of Rs. 15/- per month for 48 hours staff. But the Institute as per the Office Order referred to above made an expenditure of Rs. 28.381.78 P. against this although there was no subsequent grant by the Government of India in this regard.

(vii) For the purpose of Income and Expenditure Account the allocations between Plan and Non-Plan as made by the officials of the Institute have been accepted by us.

Further, for the purpose of this report, we have accepted the allocation of expenses to different Sectors, as shown in Schedule (XI) to the Institute's Account. Our separate report on Sectorwise Income and Expenditure Accounts has not been issued by us.

(viii) We have been given to understand that the activities of the local branches at Bombay, Mysore State and Kerala are independent of those of the Institute and accordingly, the transactions relating to these branches do not form part of the Institute's Accounts.

General:

- (a) The activities of the Institute are gradually increasing. As suggested by the previous audior regarding installation of internal audit system, in course of our audit, we observe that neither there is any internal control/Audit system in operation nor any co-ordination between accounts department and different branches and sectors of the Institute. This has brought us a serious handicap in performing our audit works. We suggest for immediate installation of Internal Audit System.
- (b) As pointed out by the previous auditors the system of budgetory control leaves ample scope for improvement. There is no means of controlling the actual expenditure within the budget period limits because of the fact that the budget proposals as estimated by the Institute are considered as authorisation for incurring expenditure although the excess of expenditure over income has been piling up years together the claims for which are pending for acceptances from the Govt. for a considerable time (wide Items 4.1 to 4.4 of the Assets side of the Institute's Balance Sheet). It is also observed that grants for specific activities/items are diverted and/utilised to meet the excess of Expenditure over Income.
- (c) The pages of the Minute Book for recording the proceedings of the meetings of the Council and/or committees are not consecutively numbered and proceedings are not written on the Minute Book but are typed on separate sbeets and pasted on the Minute Book.

Annexure 1

Re: Audit of the Trial Balance as at 31st March, 1974, of Indian Statistical Institute,

We have audited the Trial Balance as at 31st March, 1974 of your Giridih Branch and our observations on the more important points of the Trial Balance and various Schedules submitted to us are given hereunder for your information. We will discuss in details in connection with the preparation of final accounts of the Institute with the Chief Accounts Officer at Baranagar at the time of checking the consolidated accounts.

FIXED ASSETS

(a) Land and Buildings

The Institute owns the following land and buildings at Giridih:-

- (1) Farm Land
- (2) Rose Villa
- (3) Prakriti Devi Ganguly's Land
- (4) Health Home
- (5) Biroja Kuthi

Title Deeds of the first two properties are at Patna-High Court and of the third at Hazarbagh Court in connection with suits filed against the Institute. Title Deeds of the Court and folk, we were told, are at Baranagar, and will be inspected by us at the time of final audit at Bernager.

(b) Furniture and Fixtures

No physical inventory as at 31st March, 1974 of fixed assets, particularly of furniture and fixture (which are easily removable articles) was taken for the purpose of verification. As a reak we could not verify fixed assets items that will appear in the Final Consolidated Accounts of the Institute as at 31st March 1974. A sort of Asset Register is being maintained at Giridhi and the same was produced before us. But it is neither up-to-date nor appears to have been checked by any responsible Official of the Institute at any time during the year of our audit. As such the said Register is of little use from audit point of view. There is also no proper records of damaged and bolea items of furniture. We also did not receive any Custody Certificate from the Officer-in-charge.

STOCKS AND STORES IN HAND

On going through the inventories of building materials made on 31st March, 1974 it was

noticed that there has been practically no movements during the year of surplus building materials lying in storage for a considerable period. For example:—

The action, if any, taken by the Administration for the early use/disposal of these materials to prevent further loss through damage and deterioration, has not produced any results of are as is noticed from the above comparative Statement up to the date of our audit at the Branch.

Interest Received on P.F. (Workers)

Interest received on P.F. (Workers) has been accounted on the basis of loan given for the entire period irrespective of the accounting period.

Stock of Printing and Stationery

During the course of our audit it is found that the Stock Ledger is not maintained up to date for which physical verification could not be made.

RENTED PREMISES

During the course of checking payment for Rent for 1973-74 (including Municipal Taxes and Ground Rents) for the various premises taken for Office use and for Residential/Guest House purposes, we requested the Officer-in-Charge to furnish us with a statement showing the names of the landlords and terms and conditions of the tenancies together with supporting Rent/Lease agreements for the purpose of our verification. We were furnished with Rent agreement of the following (some of the agreements, however, expired but not renewed), namely,

- (i) Himani Bhavan
- (ii) Nioei Kuthi
- (iii) R. N. Ghosh's House
- (iv) Khubilal House

Of the remaining fourteen three premises have been given up during the month of March, 1974, another one is vacant and under decision of the Head Office, and about the remaining ten we were told that Rent agreements/Lease if any will be available at Baranasas.

It is however understood that regarding the renewal of Rent/Lease agreement, if any, is being looked into at the Head Office.

GUEST HOUSE

There are three buildings—Mohua, Salboni and Uttara—at Giridih which are used for Guest House purpose. The 'Mohua' exclusively as guest house, 'Salboni' for guest house-cumlibrary and Utrara for guest house-cum-outdoor dispensary. It was however noticed (from the numbers of visitors in 1973-74) that the accoramodation available for the purpose of guests was far in excess of what was required by the Institute during 1973-74 (number of visitors during 1973-74 was 58 at Uttara, 51 at Salboni and only 17 at Mohua and the number of days stayed 71, 207 and 344 respectively).

TIBRARY AND READING ROOM

- (a) No physical verification list of books as at 31st March 1974 was available for the purpose of our audit. We were told that the last verification was made in 1970.
- (b) Reading Room—A number of English and Vernacular dailies in Salboni Building. The Reading Room is kept open for only one hour during office time. As a tesult it was noticed that only a few readers were making use of the Reading Room.

As regards issue of books from the Institute and circulating Library it was noticed on going through the relevant register that only few books in a week are issued from the Institute Library and the same position in the circulating Library. The work can hardly justify one full time assistant; the Institute, however, not only has a full time Librarian but an Assistant Librarian also for the purpose. We suggest the matter be looked into and suitable action taken as early as possible.

STAFF POSITION

Strength of the staff at Giridih Office consists of 45 permanent and 10 casual employees. The present allocation of staff amongst the various sections does not appear to have been well planned. On scrutiny it was revealed that some of the staffs in certain sections have practically no work in contrast with some sections being over burdened with work, e.g., Officer-in-Charge having no direct assistant under him has to do away with administrative, accounts and correspondence job. Similarly, the assistant looking after the establishment work has to supervise wide range of work in different places at the same time to do the connecting official job himself.

We have checked the cash in hand at Giridih on 4th February 1975 and found the same to be in order.

Annexure 2

Re: Audit of Trial Balance as at 31 March 1974, of Indian Statistical Institute, Delhi Branch

We have audited the Trial Balance as at 31st March 1974, of your Delhi Branch, a copy of which, we understand, has already been forwarded to your Central Accounts Section, at Baranagar for the purpose of compilation.

Our observations on the important points of the Trial Balance are given hereunder for your information. A detailed discussion, particularly from the standpoint of Consolidated Accounts, will be made with the Chief Accounts Officer of the Institute in due course.

There is no local Asset Register. Under the circumstances, the assets shown in the physical verification list could not be checked with any Asset Register to find out shortage/excesses, if any.

A local Asset Register should be prepared at an early date and kept in Delhi Office.

There are also some Fixed Assets, lying in ISI rented premises, which are now under NSSO occupation. Though separation of NSS from ISI had taken place on 1st June 1972, the Asset/ Liability position, of ISI vis-a-vis NSS has not yet been finalised. This will, naturally, lead to complications whilst finalising ISI Balance Sheet as at 31st March, 1974.

The Institute should look into this aspect as early as possible and take suitable steps for necessary adjustments.

FIXED ASSETS

a) An amount of Rs. 1,16,000/- paid in March 1975 as an advance to Cement Corporation of India was shown under the head Building in the last year's accounts. In fact material came only in the accounting year 1973-47 subsequently on different dates and the said work is not yet completed. It is also seen that an amount of Rs. 37,792.38 is still lying as an advance. This requires the reversal of the said capitalisation and the amount for which the material received to be grouped under Capital Work in Progress and Stock of Material respectively.

Additions to Buildings-Rs. 8,84,025.99

b) The work as regards the building is actually in progress and not completed, hence in our only not have been as the shown in the capital work in progress. Moreover, the amount referred to above includes materials at site, stock of cement and stock of iron materials amounting to Rs. 2,67,267.15, Rs. 52,407.65 and Rs. 1,24,389.87 respectively also should have been shown in the materials at site, stock of cement and iron materials leaving the balance actually represents the value of work-in-progress.

RE: RENT

The Delhi Office has taken a number of premises on rental basis. Some of the premises were occupied by NSS employees and were subsequently vacated by June 1973. Recovery of rent in respect of these premises has created many problems as a result of which outstandings are lying unrecovered.

Some of these premises are also being used as offices in violation of D.D.A. rules (premise being in residential areas). Eviction notices and law suits are pending in courts in which IS1 is also involved. We had discussed the matter with the Institute Counsel Shri P.D. Bhargava and were given to understend that most likely Institute also (in addition to the landlords) will have to pay compensation in connection with these eviction suits but the quantum cannot be ascertained at this stage. Institute, has, therefore, some definite liabilities in these connections but because of the under terminable character the question of making provisions has not been looked into. We were further given to understand by the Counsel that Institute is contesting these cases just to gun time so as to enable it to regularise the matter by shifting the offices to the New Campus site as soon as the Institute buildings that are being built is complete. Institute has, however, already-incurred substantial law charges in this connection. The matter might be looked into so as to expeditiously complete the construction of the building. This is necessary because it was found on visiting the construction site and discussing with the Institute Architect and Contractors of the building that payments by the Institute are not being made in time which might slow down the pax of construction.

There were two or three subordinate staffs who were given House Rent Allowances though they enjoyed rent-free quarters at J-19 Hauz Khas, New Delhi, The matter should be looked into.

House No: Y-22 Hour Khar: While checking of Bank (Canara Bank, Delhi Branch), note: (1) Rent for the premises No. Y-22, Hauz Khas, payable to Sri R. N. Chopra amounting to Rt. A,466.26 for the year 1973-74 was refused by Mr. Chopra since the matter is in dispute for which legal action has been instituted by ISI.

SUSPENSE ACCOUNT

This has reference to last year's audit report in which immediate attention was drawn to the case of Sri Rai Narain's Suspense account which was rather serious.

The matter was referred to an Inquiry Authority by ISI Administration vide its office order No D/PU/I155/74 dated July 17, 1974. The Inquiry Authority's findings were subsequently circulated vide office order No. D/PU/2506/74 and action taken accordingly which reads as follows:—

"On the basis of the report of the Inquiry Authority on the charges against Shri Raj Narain Mahato, it is ordered as follows:

- a) Shri Mahato's suspension is revoked. The period of suspension will be treated as period on duty.
- b) Shri Mahato will return to the Institute by 31.10.74 the amount of Rs. 7.515.97 (Rupes seven thousand five hundred fifteen and paise ninetyseven only) that, as determined by the Inquiry Authority, he owes to the Institute as on 31.3.1974.
- c) If Shri Mahato fails to return this amount or a part of it, it will be recovered from he salary at the rate of Rs. 125/- per month. He will be charged interest on the outstanding amount beginning from 1.11.1974, at the rate chargeable on an equivalent loan from Provident Fund.
- d) Though the Inquiry Authority has found Shri Mahato guilty of grave negligence resuling in financial impropriety of Institute's fund, on humanitarian considerations no disciplinaaction is taken against him. However, he is hereby warned and asked to act with greater care in future.

e) Shri Mahato may, if he so wishes, appeal against this order to the Director, ISI, before 31,10.1974". Sd/- K. S. Parikh, Joint Secretary.

LIBRARY & READING ROOM

While going through the physical verification of Library books by the authority it was found that books valued Rs. 489.15 were missing and could not be traced yet. In our opinion the showe amount should be written off.

CASH-IN-HAND

We had checked the physical cash on 19th November 1974 which agreed with the balance shown in the Rough Cash Book.

Other Miscellaneous Receipts A/c: 081/00

This includes Rs. 157.15 being the amount adjusted against excess cash found at the time of last year's cash verification.

Re: Travelling Expenses for attending Conference and Seminar: A/C. 115

Rs. 7,950.00 shown in this account was actually paid to a travel agent, on 20.3,74 but journey took place in the month of April, 1974, hence it is an advance against travelling and should not be shown in the travelling account.

Re: Rent Receipts: A/c. 392/95

Rent paid for the premises occupied by NSSO (Office) during the year amounting to Rs. 8,100.00, but credits against this receivable amount has not been accounted for during the year, which subsequently received and accounted for in April, 1974 for Rs. 71,700.00 only.

EXPENSES ON VISITING PROFESSORS, FOREIGN SCIENTISTS, FELLOWS & EXPERTS

An amount of Rs. 22,060.00 has been paid to the Reserve Bank of India, being the amount demanded under section 156 of Income-tax Act, 1961 by Income Tax Office Foreign Section, New Delhi, being the arrear Income-tax and interest thereon for expenses incurred by the Institute on account of Visiting Professor J. A. Gallagher for the financial year 1962-63.

Since the above payment is being contested by the Institute before the Appellate Assistant Commissioner of licome-tax, Range 'R', New Delhi, the above amount in our opinion should be booked under Loans and Advances.

MATERIALS AT SITE

The Institute is paying 80% of value as an advance against the Material at Site as on the date of different running fills brought by Contractors. In the absence of any records at the Work Site it was not possible for us to verify the correctness as to material remaining at site on different dates.

We suggest that proper records should be maintained for materials brought in and consumed by Contractors. Since the above payment have been made as Secured Advance for which Institute has lien over the Materials at Site.

CAPITAL COMMITMENTS

Contracts remaining to be executed amounting to Rs. 19,77,938.63.

INDIAN STATISTICAL INSTITUTE GENERAL PROVIDENT FUND AUDITORS' REPORT

We report that we have audited the Balance Sheet as at 31st March 1974 of the Indian Statistical Institute General Provident Fund signed by us under reference to this report and relative Income & Expenditure Account for the year ended on that date with the books and records of the fund maintained by the Institute and produced to us and information and explanations given, and subject to the remarks mentioned below, have found them to be in accordance therewith.

The remarks referred to above are:

 Interim relief paid to workers during 1971 from which deductions were made on account of P.F. and shown separately.

While allocating interest in the Income & Expenditure Account interest for the above has not been separated and credited with the above deductions. But it is reported that while paying the above liability principal amount as well as interest up-to-date shall also to be paid to the employees.

- 2. Liability on account of members' own subscription and employer's contribution i.e. total P.F. dues to employees includes liabilities to employees of Indian Statistical Institute as well as employees of NSSO who were previously employed with ISI now transferred to NSSO. As per Balance Sheet total liabilities on account of Provident Fund have been shown without separating the liabilities to the employees of the ISI itself and NSSO staffs who now do not belong to ISI. In this connection it may be mentioned that NSSO, a Government Organisation, has been separated from ISI and such separation took place on and from 1st June, 1972 but still settlement of P.F. dues have not been determined by ISI and shown separately in the Balance Sheet of Indian Statistical Institute General Provident Fund. In our opinion immediate step should be taken to determine the liability on account of P.F. dues to NSSO.
 - 3. In course of our routine checking the following irregularities were observed:-
 - (a) In some cases deductions of loans were not made in equal monthly instalments and in some cases deductions are not made.
 - (b) The proceedings of the Board of Trustees meetings are not written on the Minute Book but are type-written and pasted on the Minute Book. In certain cases corrections were made without being initialled.

(c) Interest received from Institute for utilization of P.F. money of Rs. 5,000/-.

The above amount has been credited to the Income & Expenditure Account as the interest received from ISI for utilizing P.F. money. In this regard please refer our report on the General Balance Sheet.

(d) Relief loan to Members

No detailed list of the above account has been produced to us. Hence we could not verify the said account.

(e) Investment of Rs. 50,000/- on 12-Year National Plan Savings Certificate.

The above certificate matured on 27.8.71 but it was not re-invested after being matured and kept lying with the Post Office. However, an additional interest of Rs. 12,375.00 was received for the uninvested period by the Trustce from the Post Office on 7.10.74 as reported.

- (f) The houses/sites purchased by the employees out of the withdrawals from the fund have not been supported by assignment of deed in favour of the trustees as required in rule 21(f)(i) of the rules of the fund.
- (g) Investments of the Provident Fund stood in the name of ISI have been transferred in the name of Indian Statistical Institute General Provident Fund in April, 1974.
- (h) The closing balances of the Members Ledger could not be verified by us as no list of closing balance was prepared and produced before us.
